

Funeral for Joseph Edward Fitzgerald



Beloved longtime parishioner Joe Fitzgerald entered Eternal Life on July 23rd, at the age of 85, two days shy of his 60th wedding anniversary with his wife, Ann. Born in 1938 in Hutchinson, Kansas, Joe was three years old when his family moved to the Bay Area. He attended St. Patrick School in Oakland, St. Mary's College High School in Berkeley, and St. Mary's College in Moraga, where he graduated with a Bachelor's of Science in Psychology. In their sixty years of marriage, the Fitzgeralds reared a daughter, Madeleine, and three sons: Eamon, Neil, and Owen. Joe's courage and love and true faith in God comforted and sustained his family and friends at the loss of their 16-year-old son, Owen, in 1990. Throughout his thirty-year career in the U.S. Postal Service, Joe touched countless lives with his charm and empathy. At home, he built with Ann a loving foundation for their

family, always selflessly supporting his wife and children's educations, careers, and diverse interests. A man of diverse interests himself, he read widely, traveled enthusiastically, enjoyed hunting and fishing, and was an avid music fan. He was blessed with delightful grandchildren, who were the pride and delight of Joe's life. Joe was a devoted member of our parish, where he worshipped for the past 70 years, attending Mass every weekend and following the advice of <u>Blessed Father Solanus Casey</u>, <u>OFM Cap.</u> (and great-uncle to Ann), to always "Thank God Ahead of Time." He was full of gratitude to the very end.

Joseph's Funeral Mass will take place on Saturday, August 3rd, at 10:00 am, with a reception following in Magdalen Hall. He will be buried at St. Dominic Cemetery in Benicia at 12:30 pm. All are welcome to attend.

Notes from Fr. Nick

The God of the Old Testament

Our understanding of God can sometimes be very confusing. For Jesus, the essence of God is a loving father. The Hebrew word "Abba" might be more accurately translated as *Daddy* than *Father*. At the same time, we hear about God "smiting" people for the sins of their forbearers, which is patently unfair. How can we reconcile a God who is loving and caring with one who appears to be a vindictive, vengeful patriarch?



Before proceeding with an examination of God's personality, there is a major caveat: The God we address as Father is completely unknowable without the revelation of His Son. Our human intellect may ascertain the existence of a Supreme Being, but to have access to that being and know Him in the way we know other people is solely because Christ—God the Son—has revealed Him to us. It first occurred naturally through the prophets, as well as in natural signs and wonders, and ultimately in the person of Jesus Christ. Any portrayal of God is filtered through our human meditation.

Our understanding of God as Father came about over the course of millennia through the Jewish people. One must find the oldest writings in the Jewish scriptures. These are not found at the beginning of the Bible, but are buried a little later in the book of Genesis, as well as in the Book of Job. In these Scriptures, God comes across as a capricious deity, much like the gods of other ancient Near Eastern peoples.

Over the course of Jewish history, the prophets and writers gradually come to a deeper understanding of God's relationship with his people. After the exile (c. 597-538 BC), the Wisdom writers record God saying, "It is not sacrifice I desire, but a contrite spirit." (Hosea 6:6) Blood sacrifices ended with the destruction of the Temple in 70 AD. While rabbis would not have adopted Jesus' saying, "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 13:34), for the most part they would agree that our God is a loving God.

Loving one another as Jesus has loved us applies to the Father, because Jesus is the revelation of God to the world. In John's Gospel, Jesus also states, "If you have seen me, you have also seen the Father." (John 14:8-9) We can, therefore, equate Jesus' attitude and behavior with that of the Father.

Most of us are not acquainted with the structure and sequence of Jewish scripture, and so it is easy to take any story or saying from the Old Testament and apply it equally with others. But we risk encountering a distorted picture of God if we do so. Over the course of their journey with Him, the Jewish people



grew in their understanding of God's relationship with them. They eventually did come to realize that God loved and cared for them more than anything else.




