
Joining th P&J Committee is a wonderful way to connect your Catholic faith to justice activities, while also participating in the deep sense of community that has developed amongst the members.



# Problematic Principles

Whenever I hear someone say, "I'm upholding a principle!" I suspect they have run out of better arguments. Principles are important. They usually come from lived experience and point the way to a more just, humane, or easier future. The trouble is that principles have a shelf life and often outlive their usefulness. It's on these occasions that I suspect one person may be trying to impose their will on others, legitimately or not.

You may be old enough to recall when our Federal government imposed a nationwide 55-mile-per-hour speed limit during the 1970s. While there was merit to the plan initially, after the Arab Oil Embargo crisis was over, the lower speed limit was still maintained for decades. Advocates claimed that driving more slowly not only saved fuel but reduced accidents. Later it turned out that the government had recalculated the way it determined fatal accidents (counting deaths that occurred far after the accidents), and the safety effects were less than claimed. Further, what may have worked well in small, densely-populated Northeastern states did not apply in places like Montana, where accidents actually increased, apparently due to driver fatigue. The lower speed limit also was a boon to highway patrols who collected huge revenues from speeders.

The law was finally repealed in 1995. There was a calculated risk in raising speed limits to their former levels (70 mph and higher), but cars and highways had become much safer after higher standards and fuel savings were imposed in the intervening years. Yet, despite the evidence to the contrary, there are still those who say that the lower speed limit should have been retained. They believe they are standing up for a principle.



Holding onto principles is a particular problem in the Church. Often one group wants to impose their spirituality on another. Some Catholics want to reimpose the Latin Mass, while others will only participate in post-Vatican II worship. At the extreme, both believe they upholding the principle of the true Church, rather than recognizing there are multiple ways of participating in the Real Presence—the Body of Christ.

Perhaps it is appropriate for the Church to hang on to principles longer than most institutions. After all, we are preserving something essential and ancient. On the other hand, after careful consideration, consensus, and prayer, there are times when we need to move on. The lengthy Communion fasts from the past are an example. They were imposed, rightfully, to prepare

one for reception of Christ's body and to preserve the dignity of the Sacrament, but were truly onerous for many people. I remember some parishioners passing out during Mass due to the fast. The fast sometimes kept people from the Sacrament, rather than encouraging them to receive Communion often.

Ask yourself if you are defending a principle that no longer serves its purpose. It may be something that you dearly love, but is meaningless to others. Maybe you just feel stubborn and want to impose your will on others. Although there may be some merit to your argument, you may win more people to the Faith by being flexible than upholding that principle.


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
