

Dedication of St. Mary Magdalen Church

Earlier this year we concluded our 100th parish anniversary celebrations. Why are we celebrating yet another centennial event? The Church, after all, is primarily the community of believers — why celebrate a building? The practice goes back to the ancient life of the Church.

November 9th, the dedication of St. John Lateran in Rome, is a major feast in the Church's calendar. That church, a gift of the Laterini family in the fourth century, is the pope's cathedral. In a sense, it is the home parish of all western Christians. The building we see there today is largely from the seventeenth century, but the foundations of the original church are within its walls. It is out of the practice of celebrating ancient church buildings like St. John Lateran that we acknowledge our own church beginning.

In February 1923, our parish began its liturgies in local homes, but eventually in the auditorium of Thousand Oaks School. The Dominican Friars immediately began making plans for our church building. They purchased an entire block on Berryman Street from the Southern Pacific Railroad, and construction of our church was completed in July 1924, and dedicated on August 17th. Today we celebrate a century of worship in this building.

I see the need to honor our church building from two perspectives: professional and personal. My academic background is in church design; my specialty is in how a church building both shapes and accommodates worship. In the document *Built of Living Stones: Art, Architecture and Worship,* the U.S. Bishops state:

Just as the term *Church* refers to the *living temple*, God's People, the term *church* also has been used to describe "the building in which the Christian community gathers to hear the word of God, to pray together, and to receive the sacraments, and celebrate the Eucharist." That building is both the house of God on earth (domus *Dei*) and a house fit for the prayers of the saints [us] (domus ecclesiae). Such a house of prayer must be expressive of the presence of God and suited to the celebration of the sacrifice of Christ, as well as reflective of the community that celebrates there.

We humans are material and corporeal beings; we live in time and take up space. It is germane to our being that we inhabit the physical space where we worship. Religion doesn't just exist in our minds. It follows that we honor that space as our spiritual home, and its birth anniversary is an appropriate time.

At a personal level, I have feelings for this place where I have worshiped with you for the past seven years. The architecture and furnishings of our church have become home to me by their familiarity. Some day I will retire and probably move away. When that happens, a part of me will remain behind. My faith has been shaped not only by you, the people of God, but by the walls, furnishings, smells, and echoes of sound that are unique to our worship space.

A couple of years ago, illness quite suddenly took my mother and brother from the 137-year-old home where our family had dwelled for 56 years. While we still own it, and may occupy it again, I feel a separation and unmooring from no longer being able to settle on the back porch to watch the cattle and sandhill cranes in the pasture behind it, no longer smelling fish frying in the kitchen or watching a human being set foot on the surface of the moon on the television in our living room, celebrating the joys and tragedies of family life. It may be an inanimate building, but it has shaped who I am.


Our church building gives shape and color to faith just as our homes enfold our families.. It is right to honor our *domus ecclesiae* this weekend on the 100th anniversary of its dedication.

Excerpts from Barbara Gamba's History of our Parish: Our Church Building

The contract for designing our new church and rectory was awarded to the Beezer Brothers, architects based in

Washington. Chief architect Arnold Constable (who was also engaged to design the new St. Dominic's Church in San Francisco), was asked to head up our project.

St. Dominic's is in the Gothic style, which was insisted upon by then-Dominican Provincial Fr. Arthur McMahon, OP. No doubt thanks to the gentle persuasiveness of our pastor, Fr. Driscoll, OP, and our founding parishioners, the Provincial apparently sat still while Constable's plans for a California mission-style church were designed and executed.

Once the specifications were approved, no


time was wasted in beginning construction. The successful bidder for the job was a rising young Berkeley contractor, John P. ("Jack") Brennan, a St. Joseph's parishioner who would later go on to establish a fine building record, including hundreds of homes and businesses, as well as St. Mary's High School, St. Mary's College, and St. Leo's Church in Piedmont.

Contractor Jack Brennan has been aptly described as a man with both unusual ability and uncanny resourcefulness. In a matter of five months, and at a cost of \$68,210.75, including furnishings, Brennan and his crew transformed what one writer for the Berkeley Gazette Contractor Jack Brennan described as an unsightly open creek bed into our new church, parish hall, and rectory.

A concrete foundation was laid to cover Cordonices Creek, which Brennan diverted through a massive pipe under the parish hall. The type of construction employed for the church and hall was unusual at the time: it was of the best and most durable kind of its day, a balloon-form construction that will rock and sway in an earthquake, but will not collapse.

Construction was completed in July 1923, and after the church had been furnished and the appointments fine-tuned, we were ready to open for business. Dedication ceremonies took place on Sunday, August 17, 1924.

Fr. Conrad Antonsen, OP, pastor from 1987 to 1992, had the columns and balcony of our façade painted to match the natural red of our Spanish tile roof. The day before his funeral, a few parishioners repainted the columns (since turned white) red in his memory.

Our post-Vatican II interior (pictured below) was designed by parishioner/architect Frank Mighetto in 1970. Costing only \$12,000, it endured until our major renovation in 1999.

Then-pastor, Fr. Francisco Vicente, OP, commissioned a Spanish sculptor to create the wooden crucifix together with the bas-relief of Our Lady, whom Christ was regarding.




