

Fr. Laurent came to our parish in 2017, one month after Fr. Nick's arrival and less than three weeks after his ordination to the priesthood in his native Congo. His brilliance as a preacher and his quietly profound spirituality eased us parishioners in our transition from a Dominican to a diocesan parish. Sadly, after only three years, he left us to lead a Newman Center near St. Louis. Now, his Ph.D. accomplished, his bishop has appointed him President-Rector of the St. John Paul II Seminary in the Diocese of Tshumbe in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Peace I pray.



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Recent Reading

During my last cruise, a passenger on the Holland America *Westerdam* recommended I read Philip Gefter's *Cocktails with George and Martha*. The book chronicles the making of Edward Albee's play and film, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf*? which appeared on Broadway in 1962 and premiered as a film in 1966. My mother saw the play on her first trip to New York. She said it was riveting, and so intense she wanted to run out of the theatre pulling her hair out and screaming! The film left a similar impression on me.

The couple, George and Martha, were played on stage by Arthur Hill and Uta Hagen and in the film by Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor. George is a history professor and Martha, the daughter of the college president. They invite a young couple to their home for a nightcap after a faculty party, and what ensues is a game of verbal abuse and one-upmanship that plays out until dawn. In spite of the rage and vitriol, you start caring for these people and eventually realize George and Martha really do love each other.

If you like stories about the making of theatre and film this is a good book for you. This film solidified Mike Nichols as an A-list director. I think Burton—playing against type as a wimp—and Taylor—playing the ultimate harpy—each gave the best performances of their careers. It proved how versatile both actors were.

Percival Everett's *James* is a retelling of Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn* from the point of view of the slave, Jim. Everett's writing was engaging, and highlighted how slaves endured slights, slurs and abuse that free people were almost completely unaware of. I looked forward to this book because I think *Huckleberry Finn* is one of the finest novels in American literature. While I stayed with it until the end, I found it less than satisfying. I think Everett took too many liberties with the story. True, in a piece of fiction, an author is free to develop the characters as he or she sees fit, but I think that James' character grew in a way that strained credulity. Further, the unremitting cruelty toward slaves by white people seemed overblown. At the very least, slaves were seen as valuable property and continuous beatings would have diminished their masters' investment. I can't decide whether, as a native southerner, I'm being defensive, or if Everett's portrayal was satisfying some progressivist tropes the author wanted to press.

George Stephanopoulous' *The Situation Room* is a page turner. I found myself stealing free minutes from work all week to get through his account of the room in the White House where crucial events play out and critical decisions are made. Major disasters and triumphs emanated from this room.

Although earlier presidents had special rooms to handle critical events, Dwight Eisenhower first conceived of a place in the White House where vital strategic decisions could be made. The original space itself was underwhelming and primarily served as the President's clearinghouse of events as they occured around the world. More recently, the Situation Room has become worthy of what is portrayed in the movies.

John Kennedy built the first Situation Room after the Bay of Pigs disaster in 1962. The Cuban Missile Crisis was the first event in which the Situation Room played a major part. Since then, every important world event in which the United States has played a central role has been handled within its walls. The Iran hostage crisis, the aftermath of 9/11, and the killing of Osama bin Laden were coordinated from this room.

For Stephanopoulous, the room is more about the people who staff it than the space itself. They are unbelievably dedicated. Ordered to evacuate three times during 9/11, each time, the staffers looked up for a few seconds and then went back to their jobs!

This book reads like a novel, but it is about events we all lived through. I had thought of the author as Bill Clinton's brash, boyish press secretary, but he has now covered the White House for more than thirty years and his tale of the Situation Room is compelling reading.


