
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



#### Notes from Fr. Nick

## Corporate Sin

Tomorrow (Monday) evening at 7:30 pm, we will celebrate our parish **Reconciliation Service for Advent**. In light of this event, I would like to consider an examination of conscience that addresses an area of sin we are not likely to think about: it's what moral theologians call *corporate sinfulness*.

Most of us are all too aware of our personal faults, but we are less likely to think about how we are complicit in the sins of our society. Many people object to this idea, because corporate sin seems to place personal guilt on individuals who have little control over their community's behavior. While there is no denying we all share in this guilt, we should not think of it in quite the same way we understand our responsibility for personal sins.

An example of corporate sinfulness we can all relate to is in our recent elections. The base instincts that pitted one political group against another was degrading to everyone, even if we resisted engaging in it ourselves. If was very hard for me not to wish harm on politicians whom I believed wanted to impose their (by my estimation) narrowly-defined vision of America on the entire population. Even if we are not actively sinful, we are all still coping with the effects of sin. As Christians, we need to stand up to expiate everyone's guilt.

You can probably think of numerous ways that we sin as a people, but here are two to consider: Almost all of us are capable of doing more to improve our stewardship of the environment. Recycling isn't all that The Torah

hard, but it requires us

to change ingrained habits. It's harder for us to exercise control over things like industrial pollution, but we can support public policies that promote a clean environment, and we can report violations. To the degree that we passively allow our world to be exploited and polluted, we share in corporate sin.

The presence of violence in our world is a more vexing form of sinfulness, because there is little agreement on solutions. One person may be for law-and-order, while another believes that we need to excuse perpetrators because of their family background or limited economic opportunities. These positions are not where the sin lies. At least the people who hold these opinions have considered the problem and are

offering a solution. Our corporate sinfulness concerning violence more likely lies in not supervising our children's television, video games and social media — allowing them to be desensitized to it. Inaction can be a sin of omission.


These examples will probably spark some debate, but that is a good thing. More often than not, corporate sinfulness comes from not being involved and living passive lives. As you examine your conscience before our Reconciliation Service tomorrow evening, I invite you to consider how we sin as people.


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
