#### Notes from Fr. Nick

# Happy New Year!

Have you ever thought about what New Year's celebrations would look like if the date didn't fall so soon after Christmas — or, for that matter, if it didn't happen so quickly after the winter solstice? In Roman times, New Year's Day occurred in late March, at the beginning of spring rather than in the dead of winter. In some ways this would make more sense, given that spring is all about the beginning of new life.

The history of marking the beginning of a new year is immensely confusing. Julius Caesar decreed the beginning of the calendar year to be the first day in January. Although his Julian Calendar remained in use for 15 centuries, following the fall of the Roman Empire in the 5<sup>th</sup> century, the new



year was gradually realigned to coincide with Christian festivals, until by the 7th century, Christmas Day marked the beginning of the new year in many countries. By the ninth century, parts of southern Europe began observing first day of the new year on March 25th, to coincide with the Feast of the Annunciation.

In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII authorized, and most Roman Catholic countries adopted, the "Gregorian" or "New Style" Calendar." It established January 1st as the first day of the new year. However, the Protestant countries (including England and its colonies), not recognizing the authority of the


Pope, continued to use the Julian Calendar. Therefore it was not until relatively recently (1752), that January 1st became New Year's Day in the English-speaking world, including our own.

It is somewhat of an accident that New Year's Day falls exactly one week after Christmas. Thus it coincides with the Octave of Christmas and the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. Therefore, the end of the Christmas Solemnity marks the beginning of the New Year.

There's something appropriate about beginning anew after the feast of Christmas. It marks the time to start with a clean calendar and look ahead. I'm sure many of our 2025 calendars are already filled with dates, appointments, meetings and arrangements, but still there is a sense of expectation.

May God's peace be with you throughout 2025. May all our work and relationships be a sign of His grace and may you be blessed with God's infinite love.


