

Notes from Fr. Nick

St. Raymond of Peñafort, OP

Other feasts occupy the first full week of the new year, not least of which is Epiphany, which I've covered in the past. St. Raymond of Peñafort is also celebrated this week, on Tuesday, January 7th. Ramon (Raymond in English) was born to a noble Spanish family in 1175, and graduated from the University of Bologna (Italy) with doctorates in both civil and canon law. Attracted to the newly-established Order of Dominicans because of their focus on preaching, Raymond became a Dominican friar at age 47, after returning to his native Spain.

Pope Gregory IX asked Raymond, at the time a professor, to codify Canon Law. In September 1234 the Pope ordered that only his work could be considered authoritative and taught in schools. St. Raymond's collection of Canon Law, known as the *Decretals of Gregory IX*, remained the standard for almost 700 years, until 1917.




St. Raymond tried to retire at age 60, but three years later (in 1238), he was elected Master General of the Dominican Order. He became the consultor to King James I of Aragon, and his compassion was said to mitigate the excesses of the Spanish Inquisition. In 1263, he convinced the king to sponsor a public debate between Moshe ben Nahman, a rabbi of Girona, Spain, and Paulus Christiani, a Dominican priest and converted Jew from Montpellier, France. As the head of the theologians present (and with King James' accord), St. Raymond gave the rabbi perfect freedom of speech. After the debate ended, on the Jewish Sabbath, the King and the friars visited Rabbi ben Nahman's synagogue.

King James was also the occasion of St. Raymond's most famous miracle. While he was on the island of Majorca to convert the Moors living there, King

James came for a visit, accompanied by his mistress. Raymond would not countenance this behavior and told the king to dismiss his "concubine." The King refused, and furthermore prevented Raymond from leaving the island. Legend has it that he fashioned a sail out of his *cappa* (his Dominican black cloak) and made the 160-mile voyage to Barcelona in six hours! (I suspect that there is more than a little hyperbole in this story.)

St. Raymond's zeal for the faith, preaching to Moslems in Spain and North Africa, and his incisive mind are both qualities we can imitate. He lived to the age of 100, dying in Barcelona on January 6, 1275, where he is buried. He is also the patron of a parish in the Diocese of Oakland: St. Raymond Parish in Dublin. Built in 1860, the original church of St. Raymond is the oldest Catholic church building in our diocese.


