





Sister Helen Prejean on President Biden's Act of Advent Mercy

When the call from the White House came on December 19th, I was so excited I couldn't sit down. I kept walking around, saying: *"Thank you, God. Thank you."*

Along with scores of other faith leaders and justice advocates, I had pleaded with President Biden to use the power of his office to show mercy to the condemned on federal death row. Now, here was the heads-up telephone call, assuring me that the President would soon announce the greatest tidings of mercy that people condemned to die ever hope to hear.

On December 23rd, the president announced that <u>he was com-</u> <u>muting the sentences</u> of 37 of the 40 prisoners on federal death row, converting their punishment from the death penalty to life in prison. While stating his solidarity for the victims and their



families who suffered at the hands of those whose sentences were commuted, Mr. Biden said that "guided by my conscience and my experience as a public defender, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, vice president, and now president, I am more convinced than ever that we must stop the use of the death penalty at the federal level."

My letter to the president had been urgent and anxious. I have accompanied eight human beings to death at the hands of the state, witnessing up close their agonizing wait for death and their trembling last walk to the killing chamber. I also personally knew a few of the 13 persons the former president summarily sent to their deaths in his last few weeks of office in 2020. And, given his harsh rhetoric during and after his presidential campaign, I had no doubt Mr. Trump would line up people to die during his second term if given half a chance.

"With every fiber of my Catholic soul," I pleaded with President Biden:

Use your presidential power (some call it "the last vestige of the 'divine right' of kings") to commute the sentence of every federal death row prisoner. Even the few so-called "worst-of-the-worst" terrorists deserve mercy. If you decide not to spare everyone, you will be committing the same error of judgment that prosecutors make; that it is moral to support the death penalty for the "worst of the worst" and that we have the wisdom to distinguish that group from the rest.

As a fellow Catholic, I reminded the president of our church's moral evolution on the death penalty, which Pope Francis crystallized in the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* in August 2018: No matter how grievous the crime, we may never entrust to frail, human authorities the God-like power to take life. I recounted to the pope my dialogue with Pope John Paul II in 1997 when I asked him if the church respected the "inviolable dignity" *only* of the innocent. What about the inherent dignity of all humans, even of those guilty of crimes?

I am heartened to hear that President Biden will visit with Pope Francis in January before he leaves office. What a team! During the noontime prayer of the Angelus in Rome recently, the Pope <u>prayed</u> that all death sentences would be commuted to life.

"Even the most heinous of our sins does not mar our identity in God's eyes," the pope wrote earlier this year in a preface to a book on prison chaplaincy. "We remain His children, loved by Him, protected by Him and considered precious." My parting words to the president were these: "Now, in your final legacy, I urge you to enact what may be the most Christlike act you will ever render: reaching out to save the lives of those condemned to die. I am praying mightily for you."

May every United States governor who continues to exact a *"life for a life"* in their killing chambers follow the president's historic example. ~ Sr. Helen Prejean, C.S.J., **author of** *Dead Man Walking*

Notes from Fr. Nick





What about the morality of war? Jesus preaches a gospel of radical peace, and yet popes have led armies into battle. Pacifists like Dietrich Bonhoeffer have plotted to kill tyrants like Hitler. Apparently, the Church's teaching on the morality of war is complicated. I am against war; it is intrinsically evil! But I support self-defense.

Saint Augustine defined what came to be called the *Just War Ethic* when he taught that one has the right to defend one's self and come to the aid of the defenseless. Over the centuries, criteria for a "Just War" developed from his teaching:

- It must be a just cause. ٠
- The threat must be real and lasting.
- Certain damage has been inflicted by the aggressor. ۲
- All other peaceful means have been exhausted. ٠
- War must be declared by a legitimate authority. ٠

The trouble is, these categories are pretty slippery. Some examples: it's easy for the defendant to retaliate with overwhelming and disproportionate force. What looks like a just cause to one side is unbridled aggression to the other. Being prepared to defend oneself or one's neighbor can easily slip into taking advantage of others.

At this time in our country's history, I think we might reflect and have thoughtful discussions about the role of the military in our country. On one hand, it's essential to defend ourselves. As a superpower, like it or not, we also have obligations to peoples less able to defend themselves. We need thoughtful military leaders who know how to defend us and our neighbors, but also know when it's time to back off. Being a pacifist may be an appropriate moral stance for an individual, but it might also be irresponsible for a larger society.



Here are some military leaders who deserve our prayers: Admiral Linda Fagan (Commandant, United States Coast Guard), Admiral Alvin Holsey (Commander, U.S. Southern Command), General Jacqueline Van Ovost (Commander, U.S. Transportation Command), and Admiral Lisa Franchetti (Chief of Naval Operations) all

"War can easily be chosen by invoking all sorts of allegedly humanitarian, defensive or precautionary excuses, and even resorting to the manipulation of information.

In recent decades, every single war has been ostensibly 'justified.' The Catechism of the Catholic Church speaks of the possibility of legitimate defense by means of military force, which involves demonstrating that certain 'rigorous conditions of moral legitimacy' have been met.

Yet it is easy to fall into an overly broad interpretation of this potential right. In this way, some would also wrongly justify even 'preventive' attacks or acts of war that can hardly avoid entailing evils and disorders graver than the evil to be eliminated"
