



#### Notes from Fr. Nick

## Inauguration Day

Tomorrow (Monday) is Inauguration Day. While many of us were shocked by the reach of Donald Trump's victory on November 5<sup>th</sup>, some reflection since may have enlightened us regarding the fundamental shift in American politics. I re-read my bulletin column from January 15, 2017 about Trump's first victory (before I was assigned to Saint Mary Magdalen) and my comments were telling.

Back then I noted that the constitutional process appeared to be working. While Trump did not win the popular vote (no matter what he claimed), there was no talk of a *coup d'état*. I'm not so sure that would have been the case this time around if Mr. Trump had lost. During the January 6<sup>th</sup> insurrection, the Joint Chiefs of Staff had to issue a statement emphasizing they were ultimately pledged to defend the Constitution and not the President. Some statements he has made regarding his upcoming term of office highlight the need to shore up protections for the rule of law and the checks and balances built into our government.

When I wrote that column eight years ago, I had cited J.D. Vance's book, *Hillbilly Elegy*, noting how he saw working-class males as being left out of the national discussion since the 1980s. Mr. Vance exposed how people who were once the backbone of the American economy saw their influence and earning power eroded. He warned that the rest of the country should pay attention to these people. At the time, I had no inkling that J.D. Vance would become our Vice President in 2025. These words have come back to haunt me!

In his book, J.D. Vance was also critical of working-class people, claiming that, as a group, they made choices that thwarted their best interests. So it's ironic that Mr. Vance, once a critic of Donald Trump, is now allied with him, seemingly engaging in the practice he decried himself. I hope that he is not the opportunist he appears to be, and will look after the interests of *all* Americans.

What does all this mean for the electorate who did not vote for the incoming president? First of all, they should take stock of where they misjudged the mood of so many of their fellow countrymen. Working-class wages and mobility have long stagnated. A secure job that is a lifetime career is no longer within reach of many of our citizens. Owning a home — and the stability it brings — is beyond the means of a large percentage of families. Inflation has eroded the buying


power for all of us. Whether it is true or not, the liberal welfare state, as it has been known for the past 80 years, has been blamed for these and other problems.

Time will tell whether the new administration is really willing to address these matters. So, secondly, it is incumbent upon our judicial system and the electorate to keep these politicians honest. It is my prayer that our country will find its way during these next four years, and that the institutions that have made our democracy successful will hold.




