




The Four Quartets

My high school English teacher, Mrs. Holly, was a prophet! Her freshman English Literature classes were like liturgy. She exposed us to a depth and beauty of our language that remains with me more than fifty years later. Her tour de force was immersing us in the poetry of T.S. Eliot, and in particular, *The Four Quartets*. On account of Mrs. Holly, I would add these poems to the canon of Scripture if I could get away with it.

Thomas Sterns Eliot was born in the wrong city, state, and country. As an adult, this Kansas City boy corrected that error and moved to London, where he worked by day as a lowly bank clerk, but in his spare time became one of the greatest English poets of the 20th century.

In his early poems, including "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock" and "The Wasteland," Eliot critiqued the corrosive effects of modern culture on the human psyche and banality of middle-class society. In a sense these poems were a critique of the poet himself. Eliot lived in interwar England's "Jazz Age," and suffered a disastrous marriage. His poetry balanced a life of relative excess.

The Four Quartets are more hopeful, and personify a mature author. They span the years of World War II, a time when Eliot became a naturalized British subject and converted to Christianity. These poems explore spirituality, consciousness, and, above all, *time*: present and past, mortality and eternity. Although not always



apparent, the poems are complexly metrical: each of the four poems is divided into five sections; they display a form similar to a symphony. In this way, their structure and symbolism interlock; time and eternity are united.

Eliot's spirituality is apparent in the symbolism of these poems. Eucharistic themes show up in images like these lines from "East Coker," the second of the *Four Quartets*:

The dripping blood our only drink,

The bloody flesh our only food;

In spite of which we like to think

That we are sound, substantial flesh and blood —

Again, in spite of that, we call this Friday good.

Yet spirituality also shows up in the poem's structure. I have always been struck by the similar meters in the opening stanza of the first of the *Four Quartets*, "Burnt Norton," and the prologue to Saint John's Gospel:

Time present and time past
Are both perhaps present in time future,
And time future in time past.
If All time is eternally present
All time is unredeemable.

In the beginning was the Word
And the Word was with God
And the Word was God
He was with God in the beginning
Not one thing had its being but through him.

Although the meter isn't exact, each passage shares a common rhythm. Moreover, they are both addressing matters of eternity. Throughout the poems of *The Four Quartets*, Eliot struggles with the imprecision of words, sometimes relying on the shape and sound of a word or passage to convey part of his idea. St. John seems to be getting at a similar theme, but addressing God as the "Word" strikes home with the meaning.

Volumes have been written on the significance of Eliot's poetry and their spirituality. His work complements Scripture and theology by conveying the meaning of our relationship with God. Consider reading *The Four Quartets* on some rainy night beside your fireplace. My hope is that studying these poems will deepen your spirituality, as Mrs. Holly's sharing of them did for me.




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
