





Set in Minnesota, where both Krueger, and our founder, **Fr. Cassian Lewinski**, **OP**, grew up, the novel takes place at a time when, states the *Kirkus Review*, "the tension with the region's Indian population remains palpable," and a number of deaths take place that "shake the world of Frank Drum, the 13-year-old narrator."

An accomplished and successful mystery writer, William Kent Krueger's foray into the traditional novel is, according to Tucker Shaw of the *Denver Post*, "both fresh and familiar... and it is emotionally affecting as well."

# Notes from Fr. Nick

# **Most Holy Trinity**

With Trinity Sunday, the Easter season has come to an end. In the days to come you will see the priests wearing green vestments and *Ordinary Time* will begin. As we close the Easter season, it might be good to reflect on the meaning of the Trinity.

Our faith tells us that God is radically One, so how can there be three persons in one God? The first thing we must understand is that the nature of the Trinity is an absolute mystery. That is, this mystery lies completely outside our comprehension as human beings. God has revealed himself in this mysterious way, but we will never come close to understanding it.

Notwithstanding that it is a mystery, we can still attain some grasp of what the Trinity means for us. **God the Father** (the first person in the Trinity) is completely unknowable to us except through revelation. This was fragmented until he revealed himself in his Son (the second person in the Trinity). In **Jesus Christ**, we know the Father in the way human beings can best

understand—through the teaching of another person. Not only by his teachings, but in the way Jesus carried himself throughout his life, He revealed to us the essence of God. We cannot fully take hold of that essence, but it is present and available for us.

The **Holy Spirit** (the third person in the Trinity) is the spark of divine love between the Father and the Son. That overflowing love gave birth to all creation, and is the grace that sustains us in existence. In addition, that grace allows us to imitate the love of God by giving it to others.

Pondering the mystery of the Trinity is like looking at a great painting, or reading a classic piece of literature. We can come back to it over and over again. Every time we do, it reveals something new to us that was always there. We never tire of it and it continues to feed our souls.

The Poor People's Campaign, A National Call for Moral Revival: 40 days of Demonstrations From May 14th to June 23rd. The Campaign is a nonviolent, multi-faith protest against policies that promote systemic racism, systemic poverty, the war economy, and ecological devastation. Each week's theme is different: Last week's (May 21-26) was "Linking Systemic Racism and Poverty: Voting Rights, Immigration, Xenophobia, Islamophobia, and the Mistreatment of Indigenous Communities"; the theme for the coming week (May 27-June 2) is "The War Economy: Militarism, Veterans and the Proliferation of Gun Violence."

### A Call for Fossil Fuel Divestment

Fossil fuel divestment is a way to care for our common home and the poorest of our brothers and sisters, who suffer the worst impacts of climate change. Pope Francis has said that an ethical and economic shift is urgently needed in order to prevent catastrophic climate change and growing inequality. Responding to his insistent message, 35 Catholic organizations and institutions recently announced their decision to divest from fossil fuels companies. *Caritas Internationalis*, a confederation of Catholic relief, development and social service organizations operating in over 200 countries and territories, and an official institution of the Catholic Church, is among the institutions committed to divest from fossil fuels.



# What is the Blessed Trinity?

The Blessed Trinity is God! There are three Persons in God, but there is only one God. "Trinity" comes from the Latin word for three.

Only God the Son, Who is Jesus, has a body. But we show God the Father as an old man, and the Holy Spirit as a dove.
