





Notes from Fr. Nick

Our Nation's Constitution




Our nation's constitution had to be amended in order to guarantee freedom of speech, abolish slavery, and enable women to vote. Great as our forefathers' vision was, it had limits. We were founded by white male aristocrats who saw a future that cast off the class restrictions of their ancestors but who, nevertheless, were finite human-beings with limited perspective. Maybe the greatest gift they gave us was the mechanism to change with the times as our nation grew and faced unforeseen challenges. That the Constitution has been amended only 27 times in over 200 years is a testament to its soundness. But the

fact that it has been able to change also testifies to our founders' vision.

I am fearful of those who believe in a 'very strict' interpretation of the Constitution. The document was created by an elite group of men to rule over a rural, agricultural nation with a population of less than four million. Today we are a superpower of more than 325 million. The strictest understanding of our country's guiding document assumes that the dynamics of our country have not changed.

Recently, many of the very people who have espoused 'strict interpretation' now want to play fast and loose when it suits them. My prayer is that the courts, who have a history of tempering the other branches of government will say, "not so fast!" We have prided ourselves as a nation living under the rule of law and not the whims of leaders. Lincoln's



conclusion to the *Gettysburg Address* should remind our leaders where they get their power. He proclaimed that our government is "by the people, of the people and for the people" We are not an oligarchy. Our constitution guarantees human rights to everybody—citizens or not.

This past Wednesday, we celebrated Independence Day. It is a good time to reflect on how the Constitution has served our country, and how it continues to serve us, as our county's needs evolve.

Last weekend, thousands of caring individuals across the country demonstrated support for immigrants and refugees by "showing up" to protest the separation of families under the Administration's zero-tolerance policy. 
