


Notes from Fr. Nick

Social Justice

During the 19th century, the Catholic Church regained a legitimate place in Great Britain largely because of the respect it garnered in helping the poor and disenfranchised. Even those who loathed the 'Papists' couldn't ignore the example we set for the 'Established Church' and the rest of British society.

Social justice may be 'where the rubber meets the road'. If the Church is to have any credibility with the rest of the world, it will be in our solidarity with those whom society wants to cast off. Yet long before our social positions help justify our Church's presence in the world, our care for the poor and disenfranchised is a basic Gospel stance that goes to the heart of being Christian.

At its heart, social justice recognizes the basic worth and dignity that comes from the fact that God made all of the universe and that human beings are the crown of that creation. If God cares for every one of us so much, then it is our responsibility to extend that care to each other. This means that not one person is expendable or without worth because they do not fit into our lives or contribute to society to the degree we would like. All life is sacred.



It was thus that Pope Paul VI, echoing the words of Fr. Pedro Arrupe, Superior General of the Society of Jesus, proclaimed a "preferential option for the poor" during the World Synod of Catholic Bishops in 1971. By this he meant that, all other things being equal, the Church must side with those who lack the basic necessities of life and who are without the means to protect themselves.


Twenty years later, Pope John Paul II, in his encyclical <u>Centesimus annus</u>, declared that the concept of the "poor" was "not limited to material poverty, but encompasses cultural and spiritual poverty as well."

We at Saint Mary Magdalen Parish answer the call for solidarity with the poor through our **Dinners for the Poor and Homeless**, our **Saint Vincent de Paul Conference**, our **Refugee Aid Committee**, our cooperation with initiatives of the larger Church and our personal endeavors. But we cannot stop there. The death penalty, fair wages, rights of the unborn, gun violence and protection of the environment are other areas where we as believers need to speak out and offer assistance.

These are not just pocketbook issues. Social Justice is the place where we, the Body of Christ, stick our necks out. Primarily, we imitate God's love when we do so, but it is also in these causes that the rest of the world takes note of our presence.





Social Justice Notes

Stop Separating Families!

More than 2,500 children of border detainees still remain separated from their families, and the Administration has failed to meet court-ordered reunification dates.

What can we do to Support Detainees? Call for their release! This was the common practice until the Trump Administration decided to incarcerate immigrants and asylum seekers, including those without any criminal records. Visit our parish website (marymagdalen.org) and search for "Social Justice" for up-to-the-minute updates on this Call to Action.

Please support this call to action! Here's how:

- 1. <u>Donate</u> to Freedom for Immigrants' Bay Area Immigration Bond Fund, Immigrant Family Defense Fund at bit.ly/reunitebayfams. This funds raised by this community fund go directly to pay for bonds and assist with families' expenses (e.g., transportation to the detention facility and phone calls to detainees). By raising money to help post bonds for those who cannot otherwise afford it, detainees will have the opportunity to reunite with their families and afford legal assistance in fighting their deportation cases.
- **2.** <u>Call</u> the Contra Costa County Supervisors and urge them to help us reunite immigrant families by publicly demanding ICE to release all immigrant community members detained at West County:

- 4. Attend the next Interfaith Vigil on Saturday, August 4th, from 11:00 am to 12:00 pm in support of immigrant detainees at West Contra Costa Detention Center, 5555 Giant Highway, Richmond. As long as the Center remains open and there are detainees present, these monthly Vigils will continue to urge for the release of detainees from this facility.


