

### St. Francis of Assisi—the Pope's Patron

This coming Thursday, October 4th, is the Feast of Saint Francis. One doesn't have to be Catholic—or even Christian—to be aware of the example Saint Francis set. Saint Francis' call for radical poverty and harmony of all God's creation reminded people that God's kingdom would not be found in wealth or power, but in kindness, humility, and care for creation.

If there is a problem with Saint Francis' spirituality, it is that we are not all able to live it fully. Personal temperament, family responsibilities, and the way our world is organized make it difficult to live Franciscan spirituality to the full outside a monastery. Even the Franciscans themselves find it challenging. The best most of us can do is get as close to the ideal as possible. We do this by actively giving to those in need, caring for our environment and recognizing we are not the masters of our world.

When Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio assumed the name "Francis" as Pope, his choice was a shocking statement about how he saw his papacy. Apparently other popes toyed with the idea of being called Francis, but they felt Saint Francis' example was so

extreme they might be criticized when they couldn't meet it. I doubt that our current pope has any illusions about

matching the saint's sanctity, but he also feels we should challenge ourselves to be the best.

The Pope's choice of Francis is a clear statement of how he sees his ministry: Early in his papacy he said that he would not judge gays and lesbians. He scandalized the establishment by washing the feet of women, Muslims, and people with AIDS. His statement on the environment tied morality and spirituality to protecting God's creation. Even the secular world is taking notice. This is what evangelization means in the 21st century!

As we celebrate Francis' feast, we are ready to take up the saint's and the Pope's challenge. Are we ready to look for practical solutions to the problems around us? Can we engage in debate with people of different mindsets and lifestyles with an openness and kindness toward them?

Can we be challenged by a goal we know we won't fully attain in this life? This is what Saint Francis and Pope Francis are calling us to do. Let's raise our personal expectations, reorganize our priorities, and treat others—and ourselves—a

little more humanely.

We're moving the traditional blessing of animals from Thursday to next weekend's Masses. Last year the blessing was an unqualified success. The animals behaved themselves during Mass, and we had the wonderful opportunity to praise God in the company



of some of his most splendid creations. Your pets are welcome inside during Mass, and the blessings will occur on Berryman Plaza afterwards. We'll provide water and treats for your pets, and clean up any messes that should occur.

We also invite you to encourage your neighbors to bring their animals to be blessed, even if they don't attend Mass with us. It's a chance to share our faith with other people and their pets.



### Update on Welcoming the Stranger

On September 18th, the Administration slashed the number of refugees it will permit into the United States to 30,000 during fiscal year 2019 (which begins tomorrow, October 1st), down from 45,000 the previous year. However, according to State Department records, only 20,918 refugees were granted admission this past year while in 2016, the last full year of the Obama Administration, the U.S. welcomed nearly 85,000 refugees. Around the world, our allies and global humanitarian groups are critical of the United States' abandonment of people fleeing violence and persecution. According to Ryan Mace of Amnesty International, "This is the lowest goal in the history of the program, and compounded by this administration's history of creating roadblock after roadblock for refugees to arrive, this is clearly as an all-out attack against our country's ability to resettle refugees, both now and in the future."

Worldwide, according to the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees, some 25.4 million people sought refuge last year, with many more people internally displaced within their home countries. Most aid groups and governments advocate resettlement as a last resort, preferring to allow refugees to return to their homes if conditions improve, rather than permanently moving to another country. Yet each day we read of terrible ordeals faced by millions. The U.S. is only intending to provide safety to 30,000 – if that. [See this space for more updates.]


