

Notes from Fr. Nick

Jesus, the Child of Joseph and Mary

The first Sunday after Christmas is the Feast of the Holy Family. This year we are reading the Gospel of Luke, and Luke spends more time on Jesus' birth than does any other Evangelist. The same holds true with Jesus' youth as well. The first story is found in Chapter 2, when Anna and Simeon, prophets of the Temple, predict the Christ Child's special call. It is at this point that Simeon proclaims a beautiful prayer that is recited daily by monks, friars, priests and religious all over the world, as it is included in Night Prayer of the *Liturgy of the Hours*:

Now, Master, you can let your servant go in peace, Your word has been fulfilled; my own eyes have seen the salvation you have prepared in the eyes of every people. A light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel. (Luke 2:29-32)

The other major story from Jesus' early life in Luke's Gospel is known as "Jesus in the Temple." (Luke 2:41-50) The family had gone to Jerusalem for Passover, but Jesus remained behind, unbeknownst to his parents. ("Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances.") Today, Joseph and Mary probably would have been referred to

Child Protective Services for leaving Jesus behind! What is important in the story is that Jesus is portrayed as a real adolescent: he's developing independence, talking back to his parents, and interacting with adults as an equal.

Before we move ahead to the public ministry of Jesus, it's important to reflect on his family life. Very little is known, but from Luke's account it is clear that all the things that happen in most children's lives happened in Jesus' as well. He was praised as an infant, and experienced the normal growing pains all young people do. His childhood should give families heart that their experiences reflect those of Jesus, Joseph and Mary.


Our Former Deacon, Fr. David Paternostro, S.J., Is Enjoying his Pastoral Year in New Orleans

Social Justice Actions

"Transformed People, Transformed Church, Transformed World."

Add your Signature to Efforts to Stop State-Sanctioned Executions in California

To sign petitions against California's death penalty, go to deathpenalty.org or cacatholic.org to sign petitions to commute the sentences of 747 persons on California's death row. Twenty states have already abolished the death penalty. The Catechism of the Catholic Church was updated this year to reflect the official teaching of the Church that the death penalty is "inadmissible."

Farm Bill and Food Insecurity. The 2018 Farm Bill approved by Congress deleted draft provisions that would have curtailed eligibility for food assistance. However, last week the U.S. Department of Agriculture unveiled a regulatory proposal to expand work requirements for those in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as "Food Stamps"). This proposal basically imposes provisions that were not approved by Congress and that restrict access to food assistance.

Currently, able-bodied adults without dependents must work or participate in a work-force training program for at least 80 hours per month. If they don't, they can receive only three months of benefits in a three-year period. The USDA rule proposal will limit the ability of states to offer waivers to this program. This rule change is *not* what Congress had approved, nor does it help families in need. Look for opportunities to protest this unfair regulation.


