

Notes from Fr. Nick

The Virgin of Guadalupe

The apparition of Our Lady of Guadalupe to Juan Diego in 1531 represents a major turning point for the indigenous people of North America, and a more refined understanding of Mary for the Church in general.

"Do not let your heart grieve. I am your mother, and am I not here with you?"

~ A message from the Blessed Virgin to Juan Diego.

For the native North American people, Mary's apparition symbolized a change of consciousness that allowed Christianity to be accepted. It began the process of inculturation, whereby European culture and Native American culture began to live side-by-side and borrow from the richness of each others' traditions. Even though this process has not been an easy one, Mary's embrace of native peoples has provided a path for various cultures to follow.

From the Christian perspective, Our Lady of Guadalupe opened the native people of Central Mexico (later most of North America) to the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ. As with other peoples around the world, their participation in the great Christ event provided a direct path to the kingdom of God.

In return, the native people of North America gave the greater Church a re-humanized image of the Mother of God. Mary is depicted as pregnant, which is affirms the dignity of womanhood that had suffered in the Middle Ages and Reformation. Her dark skin also reveals her universal character as well as that of her Son. The Church still struggles with a Eurocentric view of Christianity, but through Our Lady of Guadalupe, we are reminded that Christ is for all people and cultures.

Social Justice Actions

Ask Governor Brown to leave no one on death row – Go to deathpenalty.org to sign the petition to commute the sentences of 747 individuals on California's death row. This does not mean they leave prison, but that they will no longer face execution.

Within the Catholic Church, the death penalty is "inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person" and the Church "works with determination for its abolition worldwide." These are new Church teachings, as of August 2018.

The petition is sponsored by *Death Penalty Focus*, a San Francisco organization committed to abolishing the death penalty. *DPF* has determined that it is an "ineffective, cruel and simplistic response to the serious and complex problem of violent crime. It institutionalizes discrimination against the poor and people of color, diverts attention and financial resources away from preventative measures that would actually increase public safety, risks the execution of innocent people, and does not deter crime."

20 states have already abolished the death penalty. The state of California has not executed an inmate in over a dozen years. The last man to be killed happened in 2006; the condemned inmate was 76, and he had been on death row for 23 years.

Friday December 14, 11:30-12:30 pm - Monthly Interfaith Vigils on Immigration at 630 Sansome Street, San Francisco. Attend this first monthly "Faithful Fridays" vigil at ICE headquarters! After 7 years of vigils and the termination of the ICE contract at West County Detention Facility in Richmond, the interfaith community will continue to demonstrate support for our immigrant communities in this new SF location. Organizers hope that the monthly vigils will connect affected families and community members in this struggle to end the violence of detention and deportation.

Ending Hunger – Last month our school and parish sent letters to California legislators, asking for a budget that will end hunger. Did you know that more than 11% in the Bay Area are at risk of not being able to afford adequate nutrition? And many families do not qualify for aid, because of the relatively higher income levels in our area, despite the much, much higher cost of housing!


