





Notes from Fr. Nick

The Qualities of a Catholic School

Did you attend a Catholic school when you were young? If you did, you participated in a subculture that shaped how you see the world — hopefully, in a very positive way. This formation has been celebrated in plays that run the gamut from the musical *Do Black Patent Leather Shoes Really Reflect Up*? to *Doubt*.



Catholic schools are known for their academic standards, but schooling is more than the acquisition of knowledge. Religious teaching is integrated into the Catholic school curriculum in a way that cannot be obtained in other settings. The quality of Catholic education that stands out the most to me is the molding of boys and girls into well-rounded Christian men and women. Ideally this formation activates Gospel teachings into a 'habit of being'. Graduates of Catholic schools should be so steeped in Christ's message that they are able to go about Christian living without having to think about it.

Let it be known that all these qualities are alive and well at the School of the Madeline. As a testament to our academic standing, the best private high schools in the East Bay actively recruit our eighth-graders. Our students regularly participate in the worship life of the school and parish, and they engage in apostolic work for the larger community. Finally, there is an *esprit de corps* among our student body that comes from a strong sense of discipline. The School of the Madeline's students are taking the first steps necessary in becoming the professionals of tomorrow.

At the Family Liturgy Mass this weekend we are celebrating Catholic Schools. It's an opportunity to acknowledge the gift of committed, well-formed, young men and women that the Church gives to society at large, and a chance to recognize the dedicated faculty, staff, and volunteers our school employs. Finally, it's a time to show our support for the school as a major ministry of our parish. 
