

Notes from Fr. Nick

Miracle of the Transfiguration

This coming Tuesday is the Feast of the Transfiguration. It is a unique miracle in the Bible, because it is the only one that happened to Jesus himself. The story appears three times: in **Matthew 17:1-9**, **Mark**

9:2-8, and **Luke 9:28-36**. In each recounting of the story, Jesus takes the apostles Peter, James, and John to a mountain top, where they witness Him becoming radiant while speaking with Moses and Elijah.

In Matthew's account, God the Father is heard saying, *"This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased. Listen to him."* This statement parallels the Father's words at Jesus' baptism: *"This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."* After seeing Jesus transfigured, the disciples are mystified and discuss the event among themselves. But Jesus cautions them not to tell anyone about what happened until after he rises from the dead.

Two important dogmas are revealed in the Transfiguration: (1) Jesus is the Son of God, and (2) He will rise from the dead. In addition, the connection between this event and Jesus' baptism reveals him to be the Messiah.

For us, the Transfiguration shows the deeply loving relationship between Jesus and his disciples. Anyone who has been in love will recall how drawing apart from the world with someone you care about deeply can

reveal the essence of that person. In a space away from the ordinary, you can see into the other person's soul and know them for who they really are. Therefore all of us are capable of *transfiguration*.

AB 32 – California Assembly Bill 32 to end private prisons has been approved by the Assembly and is calendared for a hearing in the Senate Appropriations Committee on August 19. What can you do? Contact the Committee at sapro.senate.ca.gov and urge them to support AB 32.

Due Process for Immigrants is at Risk: a new Administration policy will *eliminate in-court interpreters* for immigrant's initial court hearings. Instead, non-English speaking immigrants will be shown a video orientation in "multiple languages"; no questions about the video will be permitted. Once an immigrant appears before the judge, interpretation will only be provided by phone. Interpreters will still be available for full hearings in removal or asylum hearings, as required by law.

The National Religious Coalition Against Torture (NRCAT) works to eliminate solitary confinement in America's prisons. New Jersey recently enacted the nation's most comprehensive prohibition against solitary confinement, with help from . In California, *The Center for Constitutional Rights* asked the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals last month to uphold two district court rulings for violating the prior agreement. (In 2015, CDCR had agreed to transfer nearly 1,500 prisoners from indefinite solitary confinement to the general population. The Court has found that instead CDCR had renamed and rehoused prisoners in settings that are essentially "solitary.")




