

# Notes from Fr. Nick



# St. Vincent de Paul

Saint Vincent de Paul, whose feast takes place this Friday, had a profound impact on the Church. He worked with the poor and underprivileged and reformed the education of priests. Born in a poor small village in France in 1581, he was ordained at the age of 19. Five years later, he was captured by Barbary pirates and sold into slavery for two years, but he converted his master to Christianity and was freed.

Saint Vincent's ministry to the poor is well known. He inspired lay people and religious to work directly with the most vulnerable of the world, and that work continues today in the worldwide conferences of Saint Vincent de Paul. Members of our parish conference work directly with people living in our neighborhood to help them rise out of poverty. This can take the form of financial assistance, work programs, and counseling.

Saint Vincent also reformed seminary education. Before his time, training for the priesthood was often just an 'apprenticeship' with the

local pastor. When the candidate was able to pronounce enough Latin to say the words of the Mass, the bishop would ordain him. This led to extreme inconsistencies in priestly qualification. These low standards for the clergy helped create the climate that prompted the Reformation. Vincent promoted the seminary system that, with modifications, remains in place today. Seminarians begin with training in philosophy (so they can think with precision) before a four-year program of theological training. Although seminaries have been much criticized recently, the quality of academic training remains high. Vincent founded the Confraternity of Mission or Vincentian Priests to preach and train seminarians. He also founded the Daughters of Charity to care for the poor.

Saint Vincent died in 1660 and was canonized in 1737. It's worth noting that until very recently, he was the only diocesan priest to be canonized a saint. This is likely due to the fact that religious orders have the time and money to pursue canonization of their members, while diocesan priests are on their own!

I hope you will be generous next Sunday, when we will devote our 5<sup>th</sup> **Sunday Special Collection** to our St. Vincent de Paul Conference. The cost of living and the continued gentrification of Berkeley and Albany have placed people of even moderate income on the edge of financial collapse, and our St. Vincent de Paul Conference provides a safety net for many of our neighbors in need.

Perhaps more importantly, consider donating your time and talent, working directly with those who need a 'hand-up'. Our conference meets at 7:15 pm on the first Monday of every month in Norton Hall. 


# 4th Sunday Dinner for the Poor

# Who is a refugee? How does a refugee find refuge in our country?

Under U.S. law, a **refugee** is a person who is unable or unwilling to return to his or her home country because of a *"well-founded fear of persecution" due to race, membership in a particular social group, political opinion, religion, or national origin*. Applicants for refugee status are screened by *The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees,* a process that averages about two years. The *UN Commissioner* refers vetted refugees to a specific country for resettlement. Refugees referred to the United States must then pass several background checks and are assigned to a specific city and resettlement agency.

The *Refugee Act of 1980* established the legal basis for humanitarian admissions of refugees to the United States. Each year the president determines the number of refugees and asylum seekers who can be admitted, <u>in consultation with Congress</u>. The President has been accused of failing to do this.

The U.S. resettled up to 207,000 refugees annually during the 1980s. Now the caps have been significantly reduced, from **85,000** in 2016 to **30,000** in 2019. *The Trump Administration is considering lowering the cap to 10,000 (or zero) for 2020.* That decision is due on Monday, September 30<sup>th</sup>.
