

Family Separation Update: U.S. immigration authorities complied with a federal order to report how many children had been separated from their families at the border up until a June 26, 2018 court order to stop the practice. The government reporting reveals a total of more than 5,400 children separated since July 2017. And family separation *does* continue, as the court order made an exception for "limited circumstances", such as perceived threats to child safety or doubts about whether the adult is really the parent. A total of 1,090 children have been separated under this exception since the June 26, 2018 order.

### Notes from Fr. Nick

### Fall Back into Standard Time

This weekend we will return to Standard Time and move our clocks back by an hour. It is perhaps a good time to reflect on how our perception of time has changed since biblical times. Unlike other nearby




cultures, the ancient Hebrews began their day at sunset. The Catholic Church revived this practice after the Second Vatican Council when, reviving the Hebrew tradition, they allowed vigil masses to take place on Saturday evening.

On the other hand, like their neighbors, the Jews divided the day into daylight and darkness. The day was divided into twelve hours, which worked out to six in the morning to six in the evening. Night was divided into three watches. Later, as they came under Roman influence, a fourth watch

was added. The third watch (approximately midnight to 3:00 a.m.) was called *cockcrow*. In those days, therefore, time was divided into natural segments. The idea of dividing time into measured segments would not have occurred to the average person living in the ancient world.

By the Middle Ages, however, a need arose for more accurate timekeeping, and it began in monasteries. Mechanical clocks were first used to keep the hours so that monks would not have to stay up at night, turning over an hourglass to keep track. I once saw a (still working) clock at Salisbury Cathedral built in the twelfth century. It has no face or hands — instead it rings bells to alert the hours to all in earshot. (See photo at right.)

Accurate timing leapt forward in the seventeenth century, when Galileo noticed that the sweep of a pendulum took the same time no matter how far it moved. Time could now be regulated without the vagaries of run-down springs or inaccurate weights.

As world commerce increased, the need to chart accurately a ship's location became essential. If a ship's captain knew the exact time at the Naval Academy in Greenwich, England, he could plot where he was anywhere in the world. John Harrison, a Yorkshire carpenter, won the British government's Longitude Prize in 1759. He realized that a small clock was less susceptible to the movements of a ship. Unfortunately the government couldn't believe a commoner could make such a timepiece and wouldn't give him the prize. Only intervention by King George III allowed him to receive the credit he deserved.

Standard time arrived in the late nineteenth century, when railroads required synchronized clocks to avoid collisions. Until then noon reckoned was when the sun was directly overhead. This made for time warps all over the country. The United States was then divided into four time zones with the borders at switching points. That is why the borders rarely follow geographical or political boundaries.

Daylight Savings Time arrived in America after World War I. It became the law of most of the land in 1967.

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
