The New Normal

By the time you read this, we may have some clear direction on how we will proceed with reopening the church. We will have had our parish virtual town meeting; the bishop and other authorities may have given the green light

for liturgy. There are actually two priorities I have for liturgies during the pandemic: First, of course, is the safety and welfare of our congregation. But a second emphasis will be on worship that honors the spirit of our liturgy.

We have a team working on how best to celebrate liturgy within the restrictions imposed on us by the coronavirus. Their primary concerns are social distancing within the worship space, avoiding communication of the virus, and sanitizing the church after each Mass. Social distancing is not simply seating people at appropriate distances from one another, but also working out a means of entering and leaving the church and appropriate spacing at communion. Everyone will be expected to wear a mask (or other face covering) while inside the church. *(Continued on page 3.)*



Honoring the spirit of our worship is more complex that you might think. Bishop Barber has authorized drive-in Masses, and that might work in parishes with large parking lots. Our problem at Saint Mary Magdalen parish is that we have only one route for entrance and exit, and there is a fence in the middle of the lot. I'm not opposed to the idea, but the logistics make it impractical. I'd be happy to hear your ideas about this plan.

An alternative is using the Dominican Garden. This might work better, but we would still need a large group of volunteers to sanitize the chairs and direct people in and out for social distancing. We would need to construct a portable altar as well as a 'mass kit', so we have all the necessary equipment for the liturgy.

An idea I'm more favorable toward is to schedule individuals and families for Daily Mass throughout the week. If we're able to accommodate about 75 people at each liturgy, and we have 15 liturgies throughout the week, everyone would be able to attend.

Singing, preaching, and reception of Communion are among the ways that have been proven to communicate the virus. Communal recitation of the Creed, Lord's Prayer and prayer responses also put a lot of breath into the air that are a source of danger. Enabling active participation (a priority of the Constitution on Sacred Liturgy) in the Mass will require some creativity.

I know viruses are not actually living things, and I don't believe in a 'boogie-man devil' in the traditional sense, but the coronavirus has managed to make everything that we hold dear in our liturgy dangerous. I want to defeat the virus, but I also want us to have a truly prayerful experience of the Eucharist. This means gathering as a community, hearing, and reflecting on the proclaimed Word of God, and receiving the Blessed Sacrament in Holy Communion. I am relying on your creativity, perseverance and willingness to 'pitch in' so we can be the Body of Christ in these challenging times.
