

# ART AND THE CHURCH





Even before *homo sapiens* roamed the earth, some of our primitive ancestors made religious art. This is one way that archeologists recognize the presence of ancient hominids. It was, therefore, natural that early Christians immortalized their devotion in catacomb paintings. In spite of this, the Catholic Church has always expressed a certain ambivalence about art. The same Church that built the Sistine Chapel later covered the nudity in Michelangelo's *Last Judgment*. Protestants once smashed stained-glass windows as idolatrous. Liturgical dance has been praised and condemned. The arts are less easily controlled than theology.

So what are we to make of art in the Church today? There are several kinds of art: liturgical accoutrements are used in the act of worship, e.g., the tabernacle and the processional cross. They can be both practical and aesthetic. Catechetical art teaches through images by the likes of stained-glass windows and paintings in the Sistine Chapel. Beyond this, there is devotional art, such as icons. The Eastern Church regards this kind of art as similar to a sacrament: it places the beholder in the presence of the saint in heaven.

In November of 2000, the bishops of the United States promulgated the document *Built of Living Stones*. Beyond offering a thoroughgoing discussion of the role of art and architecture in worship, this document emphasizes the place of artists in the Church. It states: "Excellent designs can be brought to beautiful completion only by competent and trustworthy professionals. These professionals have a right to compensation that matches the expectations of the outstanding competence and expertise demanded of them." (BLS 202) This volume may be the first time that the Church in the United States has acknowledged the rightful place of artists and architects in creating sacred art. Too often in the past artists were relegated to 'hired help', while the role of their spiritual expression was ignored.

Art is a basic impulse in human beings, and religious art speaks directly to this deep creative urge. Consider how creating or appreciating religious art adds to your spiritual life. When the pandemic is over, you should visit the Palace of the Legion of Honor and view the beautiful medieval art there. Even better, try your own hand at painting... or dance, music, sculpture or writing. It may open up an avenue to God's presence and broaden your spiritual life.





# Peace & Justice Notes

Cristo Rey de la Salle East Bay High School, St. **Elizabeth Campus**: The Peace & Justice Committee enjoyed a virtual tour of this Oakland school at our last meeting, and learned about its unique program. Christo Rey offers a college-prep education for grades 9-12, only admitting students whose families earn less than \$50,000 per year and could not afford the tuition of other local Catholic schools without the unique corporate work-study component that supports the cost of their education. The Committee is exploring ways that we can support this school's mission.

"Welcome the Stranger": President Joseph Biden has reversed or modified some of the previous Administration's actions to limit asylum claims and to restrict immigrant rights, including:

- ~ Terminating the "Remain In Mexico" policy. Asylum seekers are again allowed to enter the U.S. while their cases are being processed, freeing them from the dangerous and squalid camps along the Mexico/U.S. border in which the previous Administration detained them for the past two years. The Biden Administration intends to speed up the legal processes to which refugees are entitled; however, Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas says "I cannot overstate the fact that the prior administration completely dismantled the program, and it takes time to rebuild it in a way that addresses the humanitarian needs of the individuals who seek to access it."
- ~ Introducing a path to citizenship for DACA recipients and Temporary Protected Status holders. If passed, the *U.S. Citizenship Act*, introduced by President Biden on January 20, would allow TPS immigrants to turn their legal, temporary status into a path to U.S. citizenship after 3 years and give them green cards (so they can work!) in the interim. **DACA** recipients would have the same fast track to citizenship. Undocumented people living in the U.S. would secure the same after eight years.
- ~ Developing new guidelines for Immigration & Customs Enforcement (ICE). The Biden Administration intends to reorient ICE, which under the previous administration had wide latitude to arrest and deport immigrants. Many local immigrants with no criminal background were separated from their families and deported, despite having local ties and having made long-term contributions in our community.


