Notes from Fr. Nick

St. Philip Neri

Saint Philip Neri lived in Italy in the 16th century, but he was a thoroughly modern man for his time. A native of Florence, his parents sent him to live with a rich uncle at San Germano when he turned 18, in the hope that he would inherit the uncle's fortune. However, in the course of his time there, he had a religious conversion and decided to move to Rome.

Philip spent the rest of his life in the Eternal City, where he ministered to poor pilgrims, prostitutes and the sick. In later life, these works earned him the title 2nd Apostle of Rome. He had a knack for bringing out other's interests and engaging people from outside his social circle in lively discussions. This eventually developed into founding a house called an *oratory*, where prayer, performances and discussions could be held, and where the group often performed biblical stories set to music. (This, by the way, is the origin of the musical oratorio, and Giovanni Palestrina was one of Philip's followers who composed music for the services.) In 1575, Philip's society became a religious

community of diocesan priests called the Congregation of the Oratory, which still exists today in 86 communities throughout the world.

A light-hearted, engaging personality was perhaps Philip's most important contribution to ministry, and he is known as the patron saint of laughter, humor and joy. Monastic communities of the time had a reputation for being solemn and dour, for monks believed that religious work was serious business, not to be leavened by humor or wit. Philip, on the other hand, used these very qualities in service to the Gospel. In many ways, Angelo Roncalli, St. Pope John XXIII, who lived four centuries after St. Philip, had a similar jovial personality.

We live in a time when many want a return to solemnity and soberness in the Church. Saint Philip Neri provides the counterexample of a man who lived in the world, enjoyed doing so, and used that experience to further God's kingdom.

Peace & Justice Notes

Swords Into Plowshares: Good Friday Worship & Witness. Each year since 1983 a worship service has been held at the Livermore Labs to protest the proliferation of nuclear weapons which threaten world peace. There will be no civil disobedience or community action at Livermore Labs this year; instead, the Ecumenical Peace Institute invites you to join the service via Zoom and Facebook. Non-Immigration News: An estimated 250,000 farm workers receive H2A visas to enter the United States as temporary laborers. H2A visa holders are *not* immigrants; they have no permanent status and no right to apply for citizenship. To qualify, workers pay for a visa, the cost of which should be reimbursed to the workers by their U.S. employer. Private businesses (most are in Mexico) organize the process, but often charge applicants additional fees that are not authorized by the H2A program, and therefore not reimbursable. Employers in the U.S. sometimes withhold reimbursement. Per Federal law, these workers cannot unionize, and they must often pay their employer high rent for sub-par living conditions. H2A provides a cheap agricultural labor force, and that has the effect of decreasing wages and conditions for **all** farm laborers. Keep these workers in your prayers; they risk health and well-being to bring food to our tables.

Help Mitigate Hunger and Food Insecurity About 150,140 residents (9.1%) of Alameda County were considered *food-insecure* before the pandemic. Now that estimate is closer to 14%.
