Notes from Fr. Nick

Juneteenth



Next Saturday, June 19th, celebrates the end of slavery in the United States. Although it is not an official holiday, Juneteenth is a time for African Americans to reflect on their past, present and future. It should also be an occasion for the rest of us to reflect upon the status of 'minorities' in our country.

Juneteenth originated when Union General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865, with 2,000 Union troops and announced that the over 250,000 enslaved people there were freed by executive decree. Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation more than two years earlier, but his words was usually put into action by advancing Union troops. Since Texas was the slave state most remote from Washington, D.C., the announcement of freedom arrived there very late.



Since the civil rights movement in the 1960s, Juneteenth has become a nationwide celebration of Black culture and a time to reflect on racial progress, or lack thereof. In the East Bay, the **Oakland Black Cowboy Association** often leads parades and demonstrates horsemanship (one-quarter of all the cowboys in the West were African-American). Often there are also barbeques, lectures, Gospel music, dancing, and craft fairs to mark the event.

It's been more than fifty years since the Voting

Rights Act, school integration, and equal housing laws became the law of the land. Yet despite these institutional changes, little progress has been made in changing some people's attitudes toward people who don't look like them. This coming Saturday, let's take a moment to consider how racism hides in our culture and what we can do to change people's hearts.
