





## **Peace & Justice Notes**

Seeking Racial Justice – A three-week series hosted by Newman Hall Peacemaking Group will meet 7:15-8:45 pm on *Monday, January 24, January 31 and February 7.* Fr. Steven Bell, C.S.P., will facilitate these virtual events, which will explore questions such as, *"What underpins systemic racism? **Death Penalty Update:** 13 federal prisoners were executed after resuming executions in July 2020, an extraordinary acceleration under former President Trump. The Justice Department under the Biden Administration has since issued a moratorium on federal executions, and federal prosecutors have dropped capital charges in seven recent cases. But there has been no forthcoming legislation to eliminate the death penalty nor has President Biden commuted the sentences of the 46 people currently on federal death row (approximately 2,500 people are on death row at the state level).

Visit <u>deathpenaltyaction.org</u> for ways to support legislation to end the death penalty at both the state and federal level. Federal Death Penalty Prohibition Acts (HR 262 and S.582) were introduced a year ago; both are now in Committee (Judiciary).

**Background:** *Twenty-three states have eliminated the death penalty.* The governors in three other states (including ours, with 704 inmates on death row) have issued a moratorium on state executions. Interestingly, just a few **counties** across the nation represent the majority of executions. This phenomenon has been dubbed the "2% death penalty" because executions track to 2% of **counties** in the U.S.). A 2021 study by the NAACP Legal and Educational Defense Fund recently reported that after 20 years of decline, the number of inmates on death row has climbed back to 1991 levels. ## Notes from Fr. Nick

## Dr. Martín Luther Kíng, Jr.

In many ways, Martin Luther King has become a modern saint. His courage, eloquence, organizational skills and not least, his faith, moved the civil rights cause ahead at a pace few would have predicted following the Second World War.

Yet, because many people who knew Reverend King personally (or knew of him through his reputation) are still alive, we



are also conscious that he was a human being with the limitations we all share. The Reverend Dr. King had an ego. His family, friends, and coworkers will tell you there were times when the great leader could be difficult to be around.

For me, Reverend King's foibles and idiosyncrasies do not detract from his greatness. Rather,



these very traits remind me that **sainthood is not about being perfect but striving for perfection**. Every saint has possessed a fully-rounded personality that includes the bugs and annoyances that made the difficult to live with at times. Sometimes these were the very traits that made them great.

As saints fade from living memory, it is easy to forget about the irritating parts of their personalities. However, when we do this, we run the risk of limiting their effectiveness as examples for our lives. We forget that, just like the rest of us, they struggled with their faults, but they were still able to live holy lives, despite their faults. I'm sure that Mrs. King, Sr. had to scold Martin as a child. Yet his struggle toward perfection is the quality that sets apart Martin Luther King, Jr., and all the rest of the saints as well.

Jerome Baggett, Ph.D.

**Jerome Baggett**, our plenary speaker, is **Professor of Religion and Society** and the **Ignacio Ellacuria Professor for Jesuit Studies** (Endowed Chair) at the Jesuit School of Theology campus of Santa Clara University.

Professor Baggett is a sociologist who teaches a variety of courses at the Jesuit School, all of which introduce students to sociological theory and method as well as to the complicated dynamics of religion and culture within contemporary society. In addition to many scholarly articles, he has published three books: <u>Habitat For Humanity: Building Private Homes, Building Public Religion,</u> <u>Sense of the Faithful: How American Catholics Live Their Faith</u>, and most recently, <u>The Varieties of Nonreligious Experience: Atheism in American Culture</u>.

Among the courses he currently teaches at the JST: *New Atheism in American Culture, Sociology of American Catholicism,* and *Spirituality and the Religious Quest in America.* Prof. Baggett is currently leading a research project – tentatively entitled *The Varieties of Irreligious Experience* – on atheists in the United States today.

We are fortunate to have Jerome Baggett as our plenary speaker at our Annual Parish Conference this year. He'll answer our questions and share his insights about the challenges we face in evangelizing our neighbors.
