

Peace & Justice Notes

Casa Francisco Update – Members of the *Peace & Justice Committee* at St. Mary Magdalen report that all is well at the Casa. Casa guests are refugees and asylum seekers, and support from our parish helps this community in various ways, such as tutoring, food donations and house maintenance.

California Detention Centers: Last fall Democratic Congressional members urged the Biden Administration to terminate three Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) contracts with the of State of California, including the Yuba County Jail. The legislators stated these facilities are poor-quality, violate ICE standards, and waste federal funds. On October 27, the last remaining person detained by ICE at the Yuba facility was released and the facility held no detainees until another single incarceration as of December 27. During the two months the facility was empty, the **Yuba County** sheriff's department collected over \$1.4 million from ICE. Immigration advocates are pressing for Secretary Mayorkas (Department of Homeland Security) to end this contract. The Yuba County Sheriff will not – the \$6 million annual contract is too lucrative, and the sheriff's department gets paid whether there are ICE detainees or not. This is the **financial** reason, but not the only reason, members of Congress have advocated to end the contract.



Notes from Fr. Nick






Several years back, on a vacation at sea I ran out of reading material and visited the bookstore on the *Queen Elizabeth* (I was traveling as the ship's chaplain). *The Secret Life of Bletchley Park* by Sinclair McKay stood out among the shop's offerings as a good read. Years earlier, I had passed Bletchley Park on a Sunday outing with friends from London. They told me it was the center for code breaking during World War II, and so I already knew a little about its story.

Sinclair McKay weaves together a story of brilliant minds who figured out how to break the German codes, the monotonous but exacting work necessary to read theses ciphers and the extraordinary code of silence about this activity which continued for decades after the war. If you like stories about genius, heroism, and hard work, *Bletchley Park* is worth your time.

On the same voyage, *The Lake Shore Limited* by Sue Miller engrossed me for days. Be warned if you're expecting a railroad novel — this book has almost nothing to do with the Amtrak train for which the book is named. Rather, this post 9/11 novel explores the conflicted feelings its characters have about their serious relationships and the mistaken assumptions others have.

Miller masterfully exposes each character's inner feelings while simultaneously revealing how those around them read and misread each other's emotions. Her smooth writing style makes this seem deceptively easy. I hope this book will make it to the stage or screen — media which allow us to read others' emotions more easily than in print. Yet I hope that in the process, Miller's formidable writing skills will be acknowledged.



TOWARDS THE TRUE KINSHIP OF FAITHS How the world's religions can come together

His Holiness THE DALAI LAMA In a completely different vein, the Dalai Lama's latest book, *Toward a True Kinship of Faiths*, should be on the reading list of anyone who wants to work for religious harmony. Two themes assert themselves repeatedly in the book: compassion is at the heart of all the world's great religions, and exclusivity keeps us from working together.

By exclusivism, the Dalai Lama means the assumption that one's own faith is the only true religion. On this point, it bears noting that the 2nd Vatican Council in *The Declaration on Religious Freedom* and the *Constitution on the Church in the Modern World* agree in substance with him.

Beyond plotting a course for religious harmony, this book provides a concise overview of each religion's beliefs, which is alone worth the read. While the Dalai Lama protests that his English isn't perfect, the

book reads clearly, and his humorous, self-effacing personality makes the book a joy to study.
