



Mass for Eunice Jackson



At 11:30 am on Sunday, August 14th, a Memorial Mass will be held for decades-long parishioner Eunice Jackson, who died on May 3, 2021.

Eunice came to Berkeley in the 1950s, when her husband, Dr. John ("Jack") Jackson, finished his service in the Korean War.

In the 1960s, with her three children in school, Eunice began her career in community service and volunteerism that continued for over fifty years. She was an engaged leader in many organizations, including the School of the Madeleine Mother's Club, St. Mary's High School Parent's Association & Board of Trustees, the Bay Area Urban League & Bay Area Urban League Guild, and the San Francisco Chapter of the Links, Inc.

She founded and ran *Project Friend*, a weekly program in Berkeley for disabled young adults, for 21 years. She received numerous citations and awards, including the Volunteer Bureau of San Francisco Service Award, the San Francisco Foundation Award for Outstanding Contributions in *Human Relations,* and the *Bay Area Catholic* Charities Woman of the Year.

In addition to six grandchildren and fourteen greatgrandchildren, Eunice was survived by her sister, Sr. Mary Brenda of the Oblate Sisters of Providence; sons Kenneth (Debbie Lee) and Harold (Laura); and daughter, Brenda Drake, whose husband, Michael, is the 21st President of the 10-campus system of the University of California.

Eunice was most recently remembered in our parish for her faithful service at every *Sunday Dinner for the Hungry* from the 1990s until she moved to Oakland in 2016. Parishioners and friends are warmly invited to attend her Memorial Mass on August 14th, which will be followed by a reception in the Parish Hall.

Notes from Fr. Nick

Norah Hippolyte



On Easter Monday, 1997, while I was writing the final draft of my dissertation, I suddenly found myself appointed as the acting pastor of Saint Leo's parish in Oakland. I feared that I might serve the parish well, but get drawn away from my purpose for being in California for the previous six years! For the duration, I got up at 5:30 am and worked on my dissertation until things got so chaotic in the parish office that I could no longer ignore it. Then I'd go downstairs and run the parish for the rest of the day.

Norah Hippolyte was one of the parishioners who stepped into the breach during that difficult time. She was *Director of Religious Education* — a volunteer position — but she took on far more responsibility than was defined by her ministry. Over dinner and after several glasses of wine one evening at *Chez Simone* I asked her, *"What can I do to hire you away from Pacific Bell?"* She actually worked for AT&T, and I had neither the authority

nor money to bring her onboard, but my question presaged her ministry here at St. Mary Magdalen parish twenty years later.

It was clear that I would need a full-time business manager when I was appointed to be your pastor in 2017. Fr. Tim Johnson, a retired pastor at Saint Leo's, suggested Norah, and she graciously agreed to join our team. Five years have passed, and Norah has become the linchpin of our office. Her title, *Business Manager*, doesn't begin to encompass all the work she does. The fact is, our parish would grind to a halt without her. Among many other things, Norah keeps the books, runs the office, coordinates many ministries, and is the liaison with the diocesan chancery.

It's time that Norah's title reflects the actual work she does. Accordingly, I'm promoting her to *Pastoral Associate*, and she has humbly accepted the position. I don't expect Norah's actual work to change much. She will remain as Business Manager as well as continuing the pastoral work she does for us. I don't want to overwhelm her with more responsibilities, but her title and pay should more accurately reflect her crucial role here.

Please take the time to thank Norah for all her work: her competent and timely maintenance of our finances, her collaboration with many volunteers and committees, her occasionally firm response to phone and office queries, her care of good relations with the personnel at the chancery, and the myriad other tasks she carries out every day.

The **Rev. Canon Dr. Lizette Larson-Miller** is the Huron Lawson Professor of Liturgy at Huron University College in London, Ontario. She has pastored churches in the U.S., Canada, and the Church of England. Her particular interests are late antiquity and early medieval liturgical history; rites and rituals with the sick, the dying, and the dead; as well as contemporary sacramental theology and sacramentality. She is the



past president of *Societas Liturgica* and the *International Anglican Liturgical Consultation*. Dr. Larson-Miller holds two degrees in music, an M.A. in liturgical studies from St. John's University, and a Ph.D. in liturgical studies from the GTU in Berkeley. Her most recent book is *Sacramentality Renewed*: *Contemporary Conversations in Sacramental Theology*.




