

# Peace & Justice Notes

Private Prisons in California: In 2019, the California State Assembly passed AB 32, which would ban private prisons in our State. The point of AB 32 was to prohibit the operation of detention facilities by for-profit contractors, specifically addressing the U.S. practice of detaining immigrants in these private prisons. The GEO Group, a for-profit prison company, immediately sued, and last October, in a 2-to-1 decision, the Ninth Circuit Court ruled AB 32 to be illegal, declaring that it interfered with the authority of the Federal government. Last month, the State of California appealed that ruling. It will now be decided by a larger panel in the Ninth Circuit, headed by Chief Judge Mary Murguia, an Obama appointee.

About 25,000 people are currently held in detention by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, nearly 80% of whom are held in privately-operated prisons. In appeal arguments presented last month, the GEO Group and the Government argued that Congress has the authority to utilize contracted private companies when necessary. The Court questioned whether the use of private prisons is the only way to achieve its objective of detaining immigrants who enter the U.S. illegally. (One proposed alternative method is ankle monitors.)

Capital Punishment: The Biden Administration issued a moratorium on federal execution, reversing the previous administration's accelerated resumption of exécutions. They executed 13 people in its last six months; three executions were carried out in the 10 days prior to Biden's inauguration.

Twenty-three states have now abolished capital punishment; three (including California) have a moratorium. The Chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Pro-Life Activities has stated: "The Catholic Church has consistently taught that every person is created in the image and likeness of God, and for this reason we consistently uphold the sacred dignity of all human life. The U.S. bishops have also long called for an end to the death penalty, and we do so in unity with Pope Francis, who has also advocated for an end to capital punishment globally."

# Preaching

When I was still a priest of the Diocese of St. Augustine, Florida, Christina Truman was the music director of Holy Faith Parish in Gainesville. She and I were both studying for our Master's Degrees at Notre Dame University in the 1980's, and one of Christina's classes required her to preach one weekend at all the Masses in a nearby parish. By all accounts she did an excellent job, but her response was, "I will never complain about bad preaching again! I had no idea how hard it is."

Getting preaching just right requires the following: a thorough knowledge of scripture, a solid command of theology and Church teaching, and the ability to relate one's message through a story or illustration with practical application to the lives of your congregation. Maybe the most important component in good preaching is to get all this done in about ten minutes. This last element seems to be the downfall of many preachers. They believe that the longer they preach, the more impact it has. In reality, at least for American congregations, the opposite is true.

With the Graduate Theological Union, the Dominican School of Philosophy and Theology, and the Jesuit School of Theology in our backyard, St. Mary Magdalen Parish is uniquely positioned to have a variety of excellent preaching. Many accomplished preachers and many more aspiring ones are available to us. Beginning this summer, I plan to enlarge the number of preachers that our community experiences. Several faculty members at GTU and JST have agreed to preach, and in addition, we'll be asking seminarians and other students to preach from time to time.

Beyond these preachers, I will occasionally be asking men and women from our parish whose ministry is germane to the Gospel on a given weekend to offer their reflections. Finally, with his tenure at the University of San Diego winding down, we're expecting Deacon Jeff Burns to be on our preaching rotation much more often. I and the other priests in residence will continue to preach, but we hope that this preaching initiative will enrich your experience of the Eucharist.

Norah will be posting the preaching schedule on the website, so you will be able to know in advance when you will have the opportunity to hear one of our guest preachers.
