



Making a Retreat

Next week I will be away on retreat. The Church requires all priests to make a week-long retreat at least once a year. Occasionally, I make a retreat on my own, but the Diocese of Oakland asks its priests to gather together at least every other year. With my fellow priests, I'll be headed to Santa Maria del Mar Retreat



Center on the shore of Monterey Bay in Santa Cruz. It's a wonderful place for prayer and relaxation.

Retreats come in all shapes and sizes — from a daylong mini-retreat or day of reflection to a thirty-day silent retreat inspired by Saint Ignatius of Loyola. Often a retreat is a group activity with a retreat master who lectures on some aspect of spirituality. On the other hand, it can be a private, directed retreat where the retreatant meets individually with a spiritual director. Almost always, a retreat

will include a celebration of the Eucharist and an opportunity for the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Taking the opportunity for a retreat regularly, if even for just one day, is a good way of keeping one's spiritual life in order. Inevitably the experience leads to a better perspective on the rest of one's life as well. Retreats offer advantages over short vacations in that they focus on bringing meaning and order to life through the love of Christ.

The Bay Area is blessed with many retreat houses that can offer a variety of spiritual experiences. If you're interested in making a retreat, you can find an unlimited number of venues all over the world. César Chávez

(1927 - 1993)



César Chávez was a labor leader and civil rights activist who worked tirelessly towards improving the lives of agricultural workers in California and beyond.

Born in Arizona to a Mexican American family, his first job was picking crops. Although his family were poor, they never lacked food, but he witnessed at first hand the abject poverty of many Latino families. During the Great Depression, the Chávez family migrated to California for work. After two years in the U.S. Navy, César joined the Community Service Organization to help farm laborers register to vote. In 1962 he moved with his wife and children to Delano, where he co-founded, with Dolores Huerta, the National Farm Workers Association (later renamed the *United Farm Workers Union*, which is still active today).

Chávez was deeply disturbed by the appalling work conditions and low pay of farm workers. To combat this situation, he organized marches, vigils, boycotts and strikes, most famously the Delano grape strike (1965-1970) and the Salinas lettuce strike (1970-1971). He himself fasted on numerous occasions to show his solidarity with the farm workers. A devotee of Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., he always insisted that protests be nonviolent.

Chávez' activism was strongly influenced by his Catholic faith. He seldom missed Mass, and he liked to open meetings with either a Mass or prayer. He also urged his fellow Catholics to be mindful of their religion's teaching on social justice.

From the mid 1980s, he increasingly focused the UFW's campaign on opposing pesticides, arguing that they posed a danger to both farm workers and consumers.

Chávez received numerous awards, both during his lifetime and posthumously. His birthday, March 31, is a holiday in California. It is hoped that the holiday will promote community service in honor of Chávez's life and work.

Dolores Huerta

(1930 - present)



Dolores Clara Fernandez Huerta, co-founder of the United Farm Workers Association, is a leader of the Chicano civil rights movement, and has been one of the most influential labor activists of the 20th century. She has been the recipient of many honors, including the Eleanor Roosevelt Human Rights Award in 1998 and the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2012.

The second of two children, Huerta was born in Dawson, New Mexico, to Alicia and Juan Fernandez. Juan was a farm worker and miner who later became a state legislator. After her parents divorced in 1933, Alicia moved Dolores and her brother to Stockton, where their grandfather helped raise them while she worked as a waitress and cannery worker. Alicia eventually bought a small hotel and restaurant, and her mother's activism and treatment of her workers greatly influenced Dolores. She was also affected by prejudice at school, when a teacher accused her of cheating because her papers were "too well written" for a "Hispanic."

After earning her A.A. degree at Delta College, Dolores briefly taught school in the 1950s while raising seven children from two marriages. Witnessing many hungry farm children coming to school led her to activism: in 1955, she led voter registration drives and fought for economic improvements for Hispanics. She founded the Agricultural Workers Association, through which she met César Chávez. In 1962, they together founded the organization that became the United Farm Workers' Union (UFW); she was its vice president until 1999.

Huerta helped organize the pivotal 1965 Delano strike of 5,000 grape workers. Despite ethnic and gender bias, she was the lead negotiator in the workers' contract that followed. Through the UFW, she organized workers, negotiated contracts, and advocated for safer working conditions, including the elimination of harmful pesticides. She also fought for unemployment and healthcare benefits for agricultural workers. She was the driving force behind the nationwide table grape boycotts in the late 1960s and 1970s that led to the Agricultural Labor Relations Act of 1975, allowing farm workers to form unions and bargain for better wages and conditions. Her activism continues unabated to the present day.



Rodolfo ("Corky") Gonzales

(1928 - 2005)



Rodolfo "Corky" Gonzales was a Mexican American/Chicano poet, organizer, educator, boxer, and activist. As an activist, he inspired the Chicano movement, whose goal was to eradicate the social, political, and economic injustice that the Mexican American community faced on a daily basis.

Gonzales was born in Colorado on June 18, 1928, the youngest of eight children, to an immigrant father from Chihuahua, Mexico. His excitable personality garnered him the nickname "Corky." His father worked as a coal miner, and although he worked in beet fields along with his siblings. Corky managed to graduate from Manual High School in Denver at the age of sixteen. Five years later he married Geraldine Romero; they had eight children. He became a Featherweight boxer, ranked in the top three in the nation.

At age 32, he turned to politics, starting by registering voters, eventually founding the Crusade for Justice, a multi-issue, broad-based civil rights organization that embraced Chicano self-determination, creating a food bank, a job training program, and the first private, bilingual, school focusing on Chicano cultural studies.

In 1966, he co-founded a new political party, the Congreso de Aztlan, to unify the Mexican American vote. His epic poem, "Yo Soy Joaquin" ("I Am Joaquin"), was published in 1967. It expresses the struggle faced by Chicanos who were trying to achieve economic justice and equal rights in this country. In 1968, Corky led the Southwestern Contingent of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Poor People's March, and the following year he convened the Chicano Youth Liberation Conference, which attracted a great many Chicano youth; several of them received scholarships from his program and went on to become activists. At this conference, his "Spiritual Plan of Aztlan" was adopted as the founding manifests of the Chicano Movement.

Gonzales died on April 12, 2005. In 2015, the Rodolfo "Corky" Gonzales Branch Library in Denver was named in his honor. On September 30, 2021, Gonzales' life and work was recognized by a Google Doodle.

Jaime Escalante

(1930 - 2010)



Jaime Alfonso Escalante Gutiérrez was a Bolivian American educator known for teaching calculus at Garfield High School in East Los Angeles from 1974 to 1991. He became famous as the subject of the 1988 film *Stand and Deliver*, in which he was portrayed by Edward James Olmos.

When Escalante began to teach at Garfield High, he complained that "There is no teaching, no learning going on here. We are just bubysitting." He came early, stayed late, and raised funds to pay for his student's AP tests. Yet the vice principal threatened to fire him. Escalante persuaded a few students that they could get jobs in engineering, electronics, and computers if they would learn math: "I'll teach you math and that's your language. You're going to college and sit in the first row, not the back, because you're going to know more than anybody."

One of Escalante's students remarked, "If he wants to teach us that bad, we can learn."

A new principal, Henry Gradillas, supported Escalante's efforts, and starting in 1978, his students passed the AP calculus exam in increasing numbers every year. In 1982, eighteen students passed, but fourteen were suspected of cheating, in part because they had all made exactly the same math error on one problem Twelve of the students opted to retake the exam, and they all had their scores reinstated.


By 1987, 83 students had passed the AB version of the exam, and another 12 had passed the BC version. In 1988, Jay Mathews published Escalante: The Best Teacher in America, and the film Stand and Deliver was released, based on the events of 1982. Unfortunately Principal Henry Gradillas left for a sabbatical, and Escalante came under increasing criticism from his replacement. He and the other math teachers left Garfield High in 1991. Shortly thereafter, PBS gave him his own television program, where scientists, astronauts, and engineers talked about how math is used every day in a wide variety of careers. The series was one of the most popular PBS programs, and was watched in thousands of classrooms every week.


