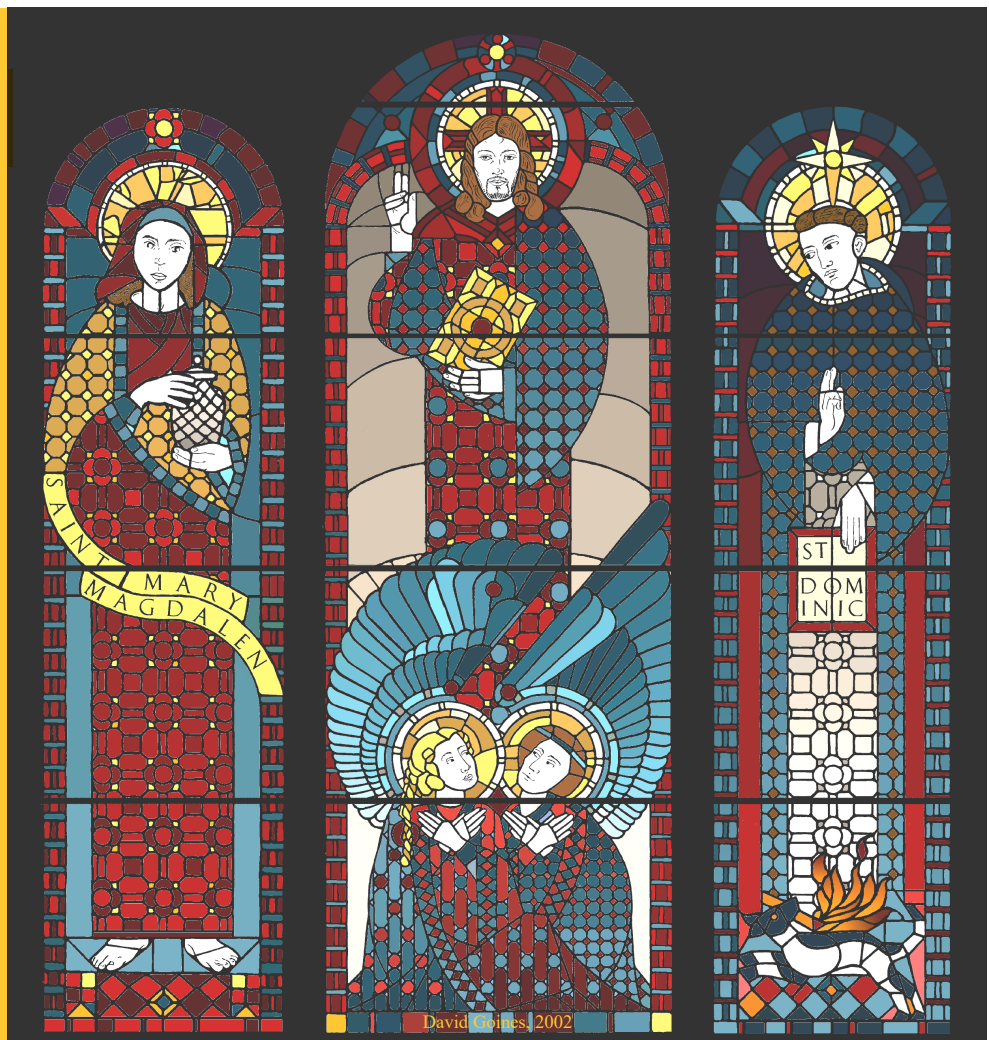

## Peace & Justice Notes

### Final Opportunity to Donate to the Women's Daytime Drop-In Center in West Berkeley

Thank you to all who have donated! If you weren't able to give last weekend, the *Peace & Justice Committee* is still collecting items after the **November 19<sup>th</sup> & 20<sup>th</sup> Masses** in the church vestibule or in Norton Hall. **We are only accepting the items requested by WDDC: baby wipes for infants and toddlers, new socks and underwear for children, hygiene wipes, and also new socks and underwear for women.** (This weekend is your last chance to donate.)

**Donations for Farm Workers:** *Celebration Nation Foundation, Inc.*, a nonprofit assisting the Latino community, is currently collecting donations for California farm workers, who experience greater economic hardship in winter after the end of the harvest season. Donations will be accepted from 4:00 pm to 10:00 pm at **2026 San Pablo Avenue** (below University — *La Marcha Tapas Bar*) through December 16<sup>th</sup>. **Needed items:** new and gently used **kids' shoes, toys and clothing**. **Death Penalty in California.** On September 29, Governor Gavin Newsom signed **AB 2567** into law, which now prevents the execution of any person on death row found to be mentally incompetent. Gov. Newsom has put a moratorium on capital punishment, but our state has not yet banned the practice.

Sadly, four men were scheduled to be executed in other States this past week: **Murray Hopper** (Arizona), **Stephen Barbee** (Texas), **Richard Fairchild** (Oklahoma), **Kenneth Smith** (Arizona). A fifth, **Kevin Johnson**, is scheduled to be executed in Missouri on November 29. The sentencing circumstances of these men vary: Mr. Hooper has always maintained his innocence, Mr. Fairchild is a veteran and severely mentally ill, and Mr. Johnson, only 19 at the time of his crime, was subjected to ineffective and erroneous legal representation.

# Thanksgiving Dinner and the Eucharist

Aside from the fact that Eucharist means “*thanksgiving*” in Greek, these meals may not look much alike, but when you look at what happens at each, their commonalities become clear.

Both meals are special, involving additional preparations that do not take place at a normal daily meal. Turkey, stuffing and cranberry sauce might be eaten at other times of the year, but they take on special significance on Thanksgiving Day. Bread and wine are among our most basic foods, but at Eucharist they take on sacramental meaning.

On Thanksgiving, people gather from near and far. I would venture to say it's the rare family that does not have somebody from outside their household on this day. So too, Eucharist is a gathering of the community, rather than only the family. Stories are told around the Thanksgiving table and the Good News is proclaimed at the Eucharist.

I suppose it would beat the analogy to death to compare the Macy's parade and football with parish social activities, but you get the idea. Just as you wouldn't limit a description of Thanksgiving dinner to its nutri-

tional value (God forbid!) so it would be grossly inadequate to our understanding of the theology of transubstantiation. While both analyses are technically correct, they hardly explain the meaning of each meal.

So, too, it is important that you partake of the richness in both meals. If you sit in the corner and don't interact with others at Thanksgiving, your family and friends will want to know what is wrong with you. You will be a “wet blanket” on the cele-

bration. Similarly, if you arrive late to Mass, sit silently while others sing, and do not acknowledge others at the Sign of Peace, you are engaging in the same type of behavior. Granted, there should be time at Mass for quiet reflection, but neither the Thanksgiving nor the Eucharistic meal is intended to be had in isolation.

Enjoy Thanksgiving Dinner (you can diet later) and participate in the Eucharist. Doing so will engage us in acts that define who we are as families, country, and Church.

## Joy Harjo (1951 - present)



Joy Harjo is an American poet, musician, playwright, activist, and author. She was born Joy Foster on May 9, 1951, in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Her father, Allen Foster, was a member of the Muscogee (Creek) tribe and her mother, Wynema Baker Foster, was of Cherokee and European-American heritage. Joy, as a member of the Muscogee tribe, chose to adopt her paternal grandmother's last name, Harjo.

As a child and teenager, Joy felt moved to express herself through the arts, especially painting, and she attended the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe. She then enrolled as a pre-med student at the University of New Mexico, but after the first year, she changed her major to art, eventually changing it again to a major in creative writing. Inspired by the work of other Native American writers, she went on to earn a MFA degree in creative writing from the University of Iowa.

Joy Harjo teaches other aspiring writers at the university level, including at Arizona State University, the University of Colorado, UCLA, and the University of New Mexico. It was at UNM that she taught Deb Haaland, who was to become a Congresswoman and is the current Secretary of the Interior.

Throughout her years of teaching, Joy has expressed herself creatively through her poetry and her music. She has often combined her music performances, featuring saxophone and flute, with her poetry recitals, stating that each of her poems is a song. She recites with a clear musical tone in her voice.

In 2019, Ms. Harjo began the first of three terms as the U.S. Poet Laureate, the first Native American to hold that honor. She has published nine collections of poetry, two memoirs, and two award-winning children's books: *The Good Luck Cat*, *For A Girl Becoming*. Her third, *Remember*, will appear in March 2023.

The student writers at the School of the Madeleine feel that one short sentence of Joy's shines with truth:

*"All acts of kindness are lights in the war for justice."*

## Secretary Deb Haaland (1960 - present)



Debra Anne (Deb) Haaland is currently serving in the Biden administration as Secretary of the Interior, and is the first Native American to hold that post.

Haaland was born in Winslow, Arizona, and is an enrolled member of the Laguna Pueblo tribe. As such, she proudly identifies herself as a 35<sup>th</sup>-generation New Mexican. She also points with pride to her parents' military background: Her mother, Mary Toya, served in the U.S. Navy, and her father, Major John David "Dutch" Haaland, was a Marine Corps officer and received the Silver Star for his actions in Vietnam.

As the child of a military family, she attended thirteen public schools across the country before her family settled in Albuquerque to be close to family from the Laguna Pueblo. In 1994, she earned her Bachelor's Degree in English from the University of New Mexico, where one of her professors was the future Poet Laureate, Joy Harjo. She later earned a J.D. degree in Indian Law from the New Mexico School of Law.

Secretary Haaland's interest in Indian Law led her to explore various avenues of service. She became the Democratic Party Chair for New Mexico in 2015, and was elected to the House of Representatives in 2019, thereby becoming one of the first two Native American women elected to Congress. Shortly after his election, President-Elect Joe Biden announced her prospective nomination as Secretary of the Interior. She was sworn in on March 16<sup>th</sup>, 2021, which made her the first Native American to serve as a Cabinet Secretary.

Secretary Haaland has worked diligently to remove any derogatory names for Native Americans from federal lands, establishing a process for removal. In September of 2021, the owners of the former Squaw Valley Resort in the Lake Tahoe area changed its name to the "Palisades Resort" as a result of the process. (The word *squaw* is considered to be a derogatory term for a Native American woman.)

Secretary Haaland is delivering on the promise she made before being sworn into office:

*"I'll be fierce for all of us, for our planet, and all of our protected land."*

## Rep. Mary Peltola (1973 - present)



Mary Sattler Peltola was born in Anchorage, Alaska, and is a member of the Yup'ik tribe of Western Alaska through her mother, Elizabeth Piicigaaq Williams. She is also a member of the Russian Orthodox Church in Alaska. As a child, she traveled around Alaska with her father, Ward Sattler, as he campaigned for Alaska Congressman Don Young. These formative experiences led her to choose a life of service. In college, Mary worked as a herring and salmon technician for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game while completing her college degree in political science at the University of Alaska.

During an internship with the Alaska Legislature in 1996, Mary developed a keen interest in local politics. In 1998, she was elected to the Alaska House of Representatives, where she served as a member of the Democratic Party until 2009. Afterwards she continued to serve the people of Alaska in various ways: as a city council representative, as a judge on the Orutsarmiut Native Council's tribal court, and as the executive director of the Kuskokwim River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission.

Mary Peltola believed that her next step was to run for election as a representative for Alaska. She succeeded in a special election for the seat of Republican Don Young (who had died in office), beating out Sarah Palin. Upon being sworn in on September 13, 2022, she became the first Alaska native to serve in Congress. Only sixteen days later, the first bill she introduced was approved by the House of Representatives. The bill will create an Office of Food Security in the Department of Veteran Affairs. She is running for re-election this month.

## Nicole Mann (1977 - present)



Nicole Mann is an American test pilot and NASA astronaut. On October 5<sup>th</sup>, she became the first Native American woman in space, and also the first woman ever to act as the mission commander for a SpaceX mission. She is currently serving a six-month tour of duty on the International Space Station.

Nicole ("Duke") Aunapu Mann is an enrolled member of the Wailaki tribe, one of the seven Round Valley Indian Tribes of Mendocino County. A native of Sonoma County, she received her B.S. in mechanical engineering from the U.S. Naval Academy, where she played for the Navy Midshipmen women's soccer team. After receiving her commission in the U.S. Marine Corps, she attended graduate school at Stanford University, where she received a Master's degree, also in mechanical engineering. Her nickname derives from the fact that, by her own description, she *"walks a bit funny—kind of like John Wayne."* Her fellow Marines thus bestowed on her John Wayne's nickname, "Duke," which has followed her into the NASA space program.

Mann served as a lieutenant colonel in the Marine Corps and a test pilot, serving on combat operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. She received six medals during her military career, and in 2013, she was selected for the NASA astronaut program. Hers was the first class consisting of an equal number of women and men, a ratio that has been maintained ever since. She is also in training for the international Artemis program, and is therefore a contender to be the first woman on the Moon as part of the first crewed lunar landing in over 50 years, currently scheduled to touch down in 2025.

Nicole Mann and her husband, Travis Mann, have one son, Jack. In an interview with *National Geographic* magazine, she stated she and her son often sit outside looking at the moon.

*"Hopefully, someday, my son will be able to watch Mom fly by and walk on the moon."*

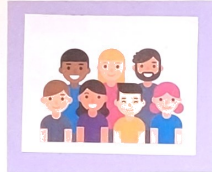

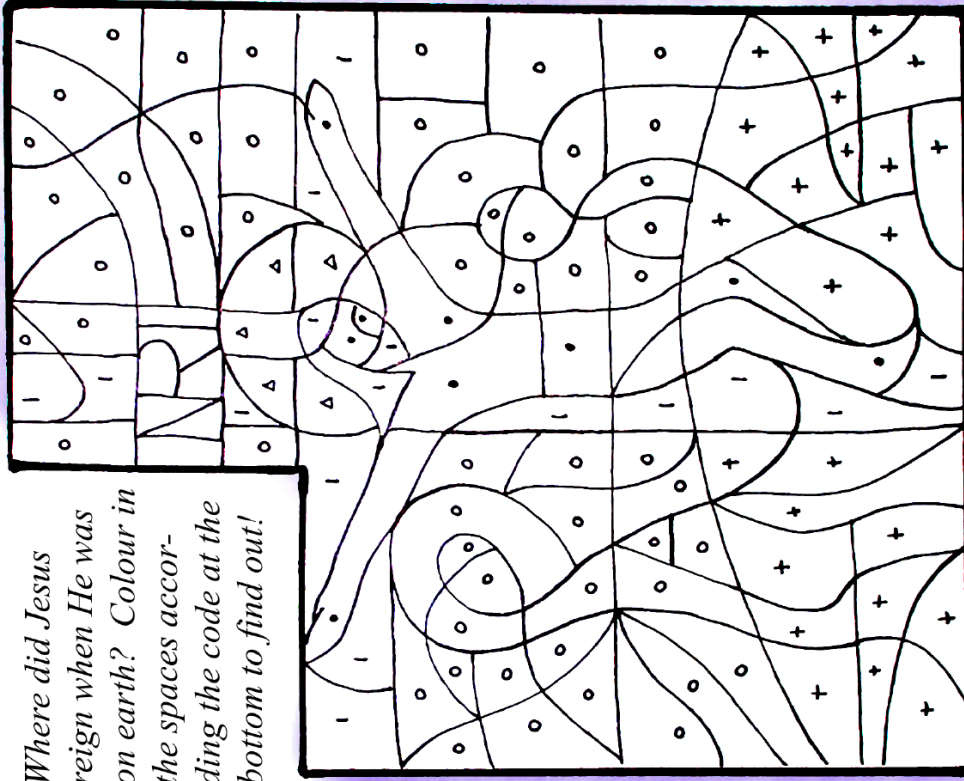
