

Notes from Fr. Nick

St. Francis Xavier

St. Francis Xavier, whose feast day was yesterday (December 3rd), often gets overlooked amid the beginning of Advent and the feasts of St. Nicholas (December 6th), Immaculate Conception, and Guadalupe (December 8th & 12th). Like St. Andrew Dũng-Lạc, St. Francis was critical in spreading the Christian faith in the Far East.

Francis had a wanderlust that would rival even today's world travelers. Born on April 7, 1506, to a noble family in Spain, Francis' father died when he was a young boy. Later he traveled to Rome, where he joined

the Jesuits and was ordained a priest in 1537. Francis began the missionary work that would consume the res

Francis began the missionary work that would consume the rest of his life in 1540, when King John III of Portugal sent him with other colonists to the East Indies. Francis almost completely circumnavigated the continent of Africa before visiting India and Portuguese colonies in Indonesia, China and Japan. At each stop along the way, he preached the Gospel and founded Christian communities.

Today we are often blasé about intercontinental trips, but when Francis made his missionary journeys, the difficulty and time required made them more akin to interplanetary travel today. Francis saw new worlds that had only recently been discovered by Europeans. No travel brochures existed to prepare him for the people and places he visited. Adapting the Gospel to be understood in new lands that had had no previous contact with Western thought required Francis to use imagination, skill, and discipline. After 12 years of missionary work, he died on the Chinese island of Shangchuan on December 3, 1552. He was canonized by Gregory XV in 1662, at the same time as his fellow Jesuit, Ignatius Loyola.

It is sad to note that in many places Christianity failed to take root after Francis' missionary efforts. Local powers, who had much to lose from the proclamation of the Gospel, were in part responsible for thwarting the Church. On the other hand, Westerners' insistence on requiring Asians to adopt European culture along with the Gospel also played a role.

Now, as in St. Francis' time, it's difficult to sort out what is essential in the Good News and what is the "cultural baggage" we add to it. Adapting the Gospel to meet the needs of peoples who approach the world from very different vantage points than ours is the soul of missionary work.

Potential 100th Anniversary Parish Event — a Cruise to Alaska!

Adoration will take place on **every Friday of Advent**, starting December 2nd and on all the subsequent Fridays, immediately after the 5:30 pm Mass (approximately 6:05 pm). Those who come to this hour of prayer do so to find some quiet time to be with God, to discern the movement of God in their lives, and to dive more deeply into building a relationship with the divine.


