

What is a CROP Hunger Walk? It's a community-based walk / fundraising event held in cities and towns across the United States. It was created to support the global mission of <u>Church World Service</u>, a faith-based organization transforming communities around the globe through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster. After a CROP Hunger Walk ends, 25% of the funds raised are returned to the host community to support local hunger-fighting efforts.

Background

The Crop Project began in 1947 when farmers were asked to donate food and seed crops to our hungry neighbors in post-World War II Europe and Asia. The first CROP Hunger Walks took place in Bismarck, North Dakota (1969), and York, Pennsylvania (1970). Since then, CROP Hunger Walk events have been held in hundreds of communities, large and small, raising millions of dollars to eradicate hunger and poverty.


Get Involved

Happy Easter!

Seen from one perspective, in saving humankind, God stepped outside his "comfort zone." In the person of Jesus, God cast godliness aside and put on all human limitations except sin: no seeing into the future, no

"smiting" his persecutors, no "magical" powers. Jesus limited himself to the resources every human being has. To the mind of Jesus, accepting death on a cross was just as much of a risk as it would be to any of us.

I believe when the Father raised up Jesus on Easter morning, Jesus was just as relieved as any of us would be. The Passion was as much a test of Jesus' faith in the Father as our lives are for us. Jesus would cease to be an example if he had not experienced his Passion and death as we do. He would simply have been play-acting.

That is what makes the Paschal Mystery so wonderful. It shows the limitless sacrifice God was willing to make in order that we become his beloved children. We are prized by God; we are his delight. Knowing this makes all the difference. God took on all the tedium, drudgery, indignity, and pain of being a human being so that we can ultimately experience godliness ourselves. The Paschal Mystery makes our lives worthwhile.

Celebration of Passion Sunday

The 9:30 am Palm Sunday Mass began on Berryman Plaza with our priest-inresidence, Fr. Ioane Ono, blessing the palms with holy water from the aspergillum, and then blessing the congregation with incense. At that point, all processed into the church for the Mass of the Lord's Passion.
