



Peace & Justice Notes Bread for the World 2023

Why should you care about the Federal Farm Bill? Jesus continually reminds us to help the poor and feed the hungry, yet children still go to bed hungry in our nation and across the globe. The Federal Farm Bill allocates over 300 billion dollars each year for farm and nutrition programs; 2023 is the year the it can be updated, then passed, to provide funds through 2028. We as a community can advocate for a better *Farm Bill* to feed the hungry – both here and abroad - as Jesus asks us to do.

The Farm Bill covers many aspects of agriculture in this country, including funding to prevent hunger and address the climate crisis. Even though we may not live on a farm, or suffer from hunger, we experience the devastating effects of climate change.

This year Bread for the World's annual Offering of Letters urges Congress to revise and then pass the 2023 Federal Farm Bill to include adequate food assistance through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); subsidies for organic and nutritious farm crops which in turn support school breakfast and lunch programs; and investments in ranching and farming practices that will reduce emissions and protect soil and water.

St. Mary Magdalen Parish is again supporting Bread for the World's campaign to achieve these and other outcomes. At the Masses next weekend, you will be invited to add your name to letters to our Congressional representatives urging them to include provisions that will improve nutrition, ameliorate hunger and protect the environment. Look for the tables outside Mass on Saturday or Sunday and sign your name to the letters!



Another Way to Fight Hunger





Books to Read

As Americans, our knowledge of Winston Churchill primarily concerns his partnership with Franklin Roosevelt defeating Hitler during World War II. In Britain, Churchill's influence covers a much broader swath. *Churchill's Empire: The World That Made Him and the World He Made* by Richard Toye explores Churchill, the politician, statesman, military leader, and Prime Minister.

Ironically this preeminent imperialist was a central figure in disbanding the British Empire. Times caught up with Britain and her far-flung colonies, and Churchill, ever the politician, had to oversee the loss of almost all Britain's overseas territories. For any student of recent world history, Toye's book is a good read. It helps set the context for the world we live in today.





The Emperor of All Maladies: A Biography of Cancer

by Siddhartha Mukherjee traces the discovery of cancer as a distinct disease and attempts to cure it over the last three centuries. Most cancer is caused by genetic abnormalities that force cell tissue to grow rapidly and infect other tissue. Viruses or other germs cause very few kinds of cancer. It can also be said that every case of cancer is almost unique. That is why it is so difficult to treat.


The politics of treating cancer betrays the disease's resistance to treatment. From the radical surgery that savaged many people's bodies to the War on Cancer during the 1960's and '70's, doctors, politicians and patients have tried extreme methods in search of a general cure. While survival rates have improved, the current thinking now advocates specific treatments for each individual form of the disease.

A cancer patient, or any person in the medical profession, will find this book to be a good assessment of cancer treatment over recent history. The book won

the Pulitzer Prize in 2011, and was on the *New York Times* bestseller list for many weeks, but I confess I found it a tough read. There's much unfamiliar terminology for the uninitiated, and the story is a complicated one. Nevertheless, anybody who is living through his or her own or a loved one's cancer treatment will find it enlightening and informative.

The Cat's Table is a novel by Michael Ondaatje about a young boy's voyage from his home in colonial Ceylon to Britain. His adventures aboard the fictional 1950s ship, the *SS Oronsay,* make for great reading. I recommend this book especially to young readers (with some parental supervision).

As a frequent voyager, I had a few problems with the details in the book. Ondaatje got some of them right (the hulls of the Orient Line ships were indeed painted canary yellow), but misses others. Even in the 1950's, these children wouldn't have had the run of the ship in the way the book's protagonists had. If you can suspend disbelief just a little, however, *The Cat's Table* is a worthwhile read.



Triduum at St. Mary Magdalen: Holy Thursday, Good Friday & Easter Sunday






