





### Notes from Fr. Nick

### Twice-in-a-Lifetime Event

Queen Elizabeth II was crowned on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1953, exactly two months before my first birthday. On Saturday, May 6<sup>th</sup>, her son Charles will be crowned King of the United Kingdom. It is the second time in my life a new monarch has succeeded to the British throne. Since this has happened so rarely, it is an event to take stock of in history. While many people scoff that monarchy is an anachronism, and some may even claim that the new king isn't fit for the job, I feel that his coronation is a moment to reflect on the role of leadership, symbolic and otherwise.

As much as we value classlessness, our species is deeply hierarchical in its organization. Anthropologically, I think egalitarianism checks excesses of power rather than providing a replacement for it. Whether in minor decisions or something that changes history, we value people who have the skills to get a job done. Symbolically we need popes, presidents, queens and leaders to give us an identity, and to provide continuity with the past and a vision of the future.



When I lived in England, the value of a head of state who was not also the head of government became apparent after a while. The prime minister could deal with the nitty-gritty of governance, but the Queen was the face of the United Kingdom both within the country and to the rest of the world. People rallied behind



her, even while they debated bitterly in the Houses of Parliament or in the streets.

The biggest problem with a hereditary monarchy is that the job of leadership can fall upon someone without the personality, skills or inclination to assume the role. This happened in England as recently as 1936, when Edward VIII, Queen Elizabeth's uncle, abdicated the throne. Hopefully Charles' longtime role as Prince of Wales has prepared him for the job his mother navigated so adroitly. Many of his predecessors grew into the role, once they assumed the mantel.


I was back in England last month, and whether

or not people personally liked the new king, they were eagerly anticipating the pomp and pageantry that comes with a coronation. The British know how to do public spectacles better than just about anybody (although the Vatican comes close). More than anything else, the coronation looks to the future; it laments the passing of a beloved monarch but says in the best British tradition, "Carry on!"

For us Catholics, maybe the most important reason to acknowledge the new King and keep him in our prayers is that he is also the head of the Church of England. Although the break with Rome was tragic, and many martyrs lost their lives on account of it, the Church of England and Anglican Churches throughout the world are closer to us theologically and liturgically than almost any other Communion. I was surprised how much time the King Charles devoted to this role in his inaugural address. Thus, his coronation is an opportunity to pray for greater unity and the common mission of our two churches.
