



Notes from Fr. Nick

Sacred vs. Secular

The terms "sacred" and "secular" are bandied about regularly as if they are opposed to one another, but the origins of these terms suggest they are complementary. Generally, the category of "sacred" is understood to include spiritual things and the purview of religion, while "secular" refers to everything else.

Throughout the Middle Ages—when the Church dominated all aspects of life— the concepts of *sacred* and *secular* were understood in terms of Neo-Platonic philosophy. *Sacred* was the realm of Heaven and thus superior to the material, or *profane* world. The terms *secular* and *profane* were often understood as synonymous.

The trouble with that concept is: God made the material world. He chose it as the arena in which we work out our relationship with Him. To look on the material, secular world as inferior (or even evil) is to imply that God has played a nasty trick on us, or that He is not perfect. The secular world is messy, evolving, and fraught with peril, but it is God's creation, and He created it out of love for us. While we can reject God's love for us and make this world a difficult place, that fault is ours (the human race's), not God's.

In the 19th and 20th centuries, the accepted point of view was turned upside down, and many philosophers promoted the secular world as superior to the sacred. They believed, like Karl Marx, that religion was just a fantasy that would eventually be replaced by science and critical thinking. Their prophecies were clearly

wrong. For good and ill, religion is as strong as ever. Perhaps scientists should realize that *human beings are "hardwired" for religion*, and accept the religious impulse as they do other human traits.

The Second Vatican Council recognized the secular world's primary place alongside the spiritual world. Its "Constitution on the Church in the Modern World," *Gaudium et Spes*, was the only document produced by the Council that was not planned before the Council started. Moved by the Spirit, Church leaders saw the critical need for dialogue between the spiritual and material worlds.

While we aspire to a life with God, it is His will that we grow in His image in this secular, material world. Not even Heaven — as envisioned in the New Testament — will ultimately be a place strictly of the spirit. The Kingdom of God is imagined to be a transformed material world, in which it and the spiritual realms are reconciled.

What does this realization mean for us? Mostly, it means that we cannot wish away the secular world in which we exist. God has chosen to meet us here, among the challenges, joys, sorrows, and achievements we experience in this world here and now. Who are we to critique God's choice?
