

# The Trades


Whether it's baking a pie or designing a new reconciliation chapel, I have a basic need to make things. My hobbies — model trains, painting and my aquarium — are often the primary outlet for this drive. The trouble is that most of my daily work is largely invisible. After Sunday liturgy or a counseling session, there is little to show for my hours of preparation, years of study and the cooperation of others. When I was writing my dissertation, there was often so little visible to account for my efforts that I would go downstairs and bake a cake so I could see the physical results of my labor.

Those of you involved in the trades are fortunate in that you can see the results of your work of your hands. If you are in construction, farming, or if you cook for a living, you are among of the fortunate who can point to something you did at the end of the day. Maybe the best example of visible results is your children as you shepherd them toward adulthood.

In the military there are ten people behind the lines for every person who sees combat. Those people provide the logistical support for the relative few who take the high risk and highly visible jobs that make the evening

news. This is also true for most of the rest of us. Those who keep the accounts, clean the offices, make the sales, and occupy the executive suite ultimately support the workers who provide the finished product. This also goes for civil servants.

As we celebrate Labor Day, it's important to remember all those who do the unnoticed things that make our society function. If you work at one of these jobs, recognize that your work is important, even if invisible. Give thanks to God for the work you do. If you're in the trades, say a prayer those who support your work. You may not think about your accountant or building inspector, for example, but they and many others are necessary for the welfare of us all.


