

The Annual Berkeley CROP Walk will take place on Sunday, May 18th and will leave from our parking lot at 1:45 pm. There are long route and short route options, and ice cream will be served to walkers upon our return to the Parish!

Where will your local donations go?

- (1) **Dorothy Day House**, serving breakfast daily for 34 years:
 - DDH now serves lunch to roughly 250 persons/day
 - They have added innovative shelters for the unhoused (4 24-hour shelters and 2 winter shelters)
 - Daytime Drop-In for showers and grooming
 - Recently added Dorothy's Closet guests may shop for clothing and supplies
- (2) Berkeley Food Pantry, which provides food for an average of 160 client families each day:
 - They now provide pet food, diapers, and baby food
 - Pre-pandemic, the BFP served an average of 40 people/day, 100 at the holidays. Food insecurity continues to grow in our area--now never fewer than 100 people/day, even in inclement weather.
 - Staff furloughs and cuts in federal assistance programs are affecting food distribution to the larger food banks, along with cuts to farmers; USDA surplus food programs. The BFP is relying heavily on donations to provide enough food, and a healthy variety.

The CROP Hunger Walk is a nationwide movement sponsored by Church World Service to raise funds to end hunger and poverty in the U.S. and around the world and choose their own location and experience.

Notes from Fr. Nick

Jesus' Triumphal Entry

Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem is a study in contrasts and contradictions. All four Gospels show a remarkable agreement among each account (Matthew 21:1-5; Mark 11:1-3; Luke 19:28-31; and John 12:12-13). The disciples are told to find a donkey; they present it to Jesus, who mounts it; he rides into Jerusalem on the donkey as people lay their cloaks in his path; palm branches are waved in appreciation.

The staging of Jesus' entry can be seen as a mockery of a king's triumphal arrival. He does not arrive on a steed or in a chariot, but on the back of a pack animal, a common donkey. I envision, in addition to his disciples, a crowd of common folk, malcontents, revolutionaries, and slackers who mixed genuine admiration with the need for a little excitement. I doubt many of Jerusalem's upper classes would have been waving palms. And the same crowd heaping adulation on their "King" will soon turn on him and shout "Crucify him!"

It seems odd that Jesus would allow himself to be put on display at an event like this. On the other hand, Jesus' care for others may have compelled him to go along with this "peasants' parade." Even if he may have felt a little squeamish about his reception into Jerusalem, he also would have felt gratitude for the

sincerity of the people who provided it.

Since his argument with Peter in Galilee, Jesus had been predicting that he would go to Jerusalem, where he would suffer and die. With his triumphal entry, his journey to the cross took on momentum. From then on, the Passion would play itself out no matter what. Was he elated, or did he feel foreboding, or both? Other than common human perception, I don't believe that even Jesus knew ahead of time exactly how the events would unfold.

An analogy might be how Franklin Roosevelt prepared our country to enter World War II. From the beginning, many people believed war was inevitable. Roosevelt started the Lend-Lease program and combatted isolationists, but he did not know exactly what would provoke the U.S. to enter the war. Jesus saw his life and ministry coming to a violent climax, but he did not know exactly how or when.

Would you have been among the crowd at Jesus' triumphal entry? Or, would you have been watching furtively from behind a door? Were you one of the disciples? How about the beast of burden? Like any good story, the triumphal entry carries ambiguities along with a major point. Take some time this week to ponder these mysteries and how they impact your faith.




